An Act to Clarify the Definition of Solid Waste in Local Flow-control Ordinances.

2	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §1304-B, sub-§2, as amended by PL 1991, c. 72,
4	SS4 to 6, is further amended to read:
б	2. Flow control. Subject to the provisions of chapter 24, municipalities are expressly authorized to enact ordinances that
8	control solid waste collection, its transportation or its delivery to a specific facility, when the purpose and effect of
10	such an ordinance is to gain management control over solid waste and enable the reclamation of resources, including energy, from
12	these wastes. This authorization includes, but is not limited to, ordinances:

16	A. Requiring segregation of wastes; and
	B. Requiring delivery of wastes generated within the
18	municipality, or any portion of those wastes, to a designated disposal or reclamation facility ;, provided the

30	<u>2-A. Limitation on municipal ordinances. A municipality may require the delivery of materials that a person has discarded</u>

34	facility. A municipality may not direct the disposition of materials that a person has not discarded or does not intend to discard.

38	STATEMENT OF FACT
40	State solid waste laws allow a municipality to enact ordinances directing that all solid waste generated in the
42	municipality be delivered to a designated disposal site. Because the definition of solid waste is fairly broad, an ordinance may
44	require a person to discard materials that the person would otherwise recycle or reuse for some other purpose. This bill
46	limits the content of municipal flow-control ordinances by prohibiting a municipality from directing the disposition of
48	material that a person has not discarded and does not intend to discard.
