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20	1. Definition. For purposes of this section, a "school psychological service provider" is a professional who provides psychological assessment, consultation or direct services, other
22	than psychotherapy, to students enrolled in a public school or approved private school.
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	2. Certification by commissioner. The commissioner shall
26	certify school psychological service providers pursuant to rules
28	adopted by the state board. The rules must include a code of ethics and practice standards for school psychological service providers, violation of which constitutes grounds for suspension
30	or revocation of the certification.
32	3. Qualifications. State board rules governing the qualifications for a school psychological service provider
34	certificate must require that a certificate be issued only to an

50	<u>4. Exclusive regulatory authority.</u> The provisions of Title 32, chapter 56 do not apply to persons certified as school
52	psychological service providers under this section except to the

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Page 1-LR0398(1) L.D. 800 extent that such persons are also licensed or seek licensure under that chapter, engage in the practice of psychology beyond the scope of this section or hold themselves out as psychologists or psychological examiners.

5. Designation. Persons certified under this section may hold themselves out as school psychological service providers or may use any business name incorporating variations of that title but may not hold themselves out as psychologists, psychological examiners or any business name incorporating variations of those titles unless they are appropriately licensed under Title 32, chapter 56.

 6. Advisory committee. There is established within the department, in accordance with Title 5, section 12004-I, the
Advisory Committee on School Psychological Service Providers, referred to in this subsection as "the committee."

A. The duties of the committee are:

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(1) To advise the state board in the adoption of a code of ethics and practice standards for school psychological service providers; and

(2) To assist the commissioner in:

- <u>(i) Certifying school psychological service</u> providers; and
- 30(ii) Investigating alleged violations of the code
of ethics and practice standards adopted by the
state board.

34B. The committee consists of 9 members appointed by the
commissioner. The membership consists of 2 certified36psychological service providers, 2 licensed psychologists,
one faculty member from a graduate program in school38psychology, one educator from a public school or approved
private school and 3 parents or guardians of students.

C.Three members of the committee must be initially42appointed for a term of one year, 3 for a term of 2 years
and 3 for a term of 3 years. All appointments must be for a44term of 3 years thereafter. Any member may serve beyond the
expiration date of that member's term until a successor has46been appointed and qualified. Any vacancy on the committee
must be filled for the unexpired portion of the term. The
committee shall elect its own chair.

D. Members of the committee are entitled to receive compensation according to the provisions of Title 5, chapter 379.

7. Transition. Persons certified as school psychologists and school psychological examiners on the effective date of this section may continue to provide the services authorized by their 8 respective certificates until the scheduled expiration of those certificates. The state board's rules must contain a schedule 10 affording all certified school psychologists and school psychological examiners a reasonable amount of time to meet the requirements of the certificate authorized by subsection 2.

Sec. 3. 32 MRSA §3840, as amended by PL 1989, c. 700, Pt. A, 14 §148, is repealed.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill amends the standards of practice and the credentialing procedures for school psychological service providers to bring those standards and procedures in line with other states and to make them consistent with the professional standards of the National Association of School Psychologists.

26 The bill is the result of a recommendation to the Commissioner of Education by the Task Force on Credentialing of 28 School Psychological Service Providers. Current certification standards are changed to create a single-level system consistent with that found in federal statutes, regulations and letters of 30 interpretation from the federal Office of Special Education Programs. bill 32 The also increases professional training standards to ensure quality school psychological services for the 34 children of this State. It is not the purpose of this bill to prevent licensed psychologists from practicing within the schools.
