Resolve, to Make Public School Teachers Employees of the State.

- Sec. 1. Reclassification of teachers as employees of the State. Resolved: That it is the intent of the Legislature that for purposes of salary and benefit administration, by July 1, 1995 public school teachers become employees of the State subject to the Civil Service Law and collective bargaining laws; and be it further
- Sec. 2. Department of Administrative and Financial Services charged. Resolved: That the Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall develop a plan for the transition of public school teachers from employees of school administrative units to employees of the State. The plan must permit school administrative units to maintain local control and direction of employment, including provision for rewards recognition of teachers. The plan must include a uniform compensation system for all public school teachers. compensation system must be based upon performance results that are competitive and fair throughout the State, must include rewards for performance and must be negotiated and administered by the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, Bureau of Employee Relations; and be it further
- Sec. 3. Legislation required. Resolved: That the Department of Administrative and Financial Services shall develop all legislation needed to implement the transition of public school teachers from employment by school administrative units to state employment in accordance with this resolve, including amendments to the law, reallocation of funds and transitional language as needed. The legislation must be presented to the Legislature by November 1, 1994 for consideration during the First Regular Session of the 117th Legislature.

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## STATEMENT OF FACT

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Under current law, the cost of employing public school teachers is subsidized with state funds. Local schools establish compensation rates based on local preferences and ability to pay and are in turn reimbursed based on their level of state education funding. In addition, the State pays 100% of the employer's share of teacher retirement to the Maine State Retirement System. Other benefits, such as insurance benefits, may be subscribed to through the Maine Teachers Association. The State has no uniform method of controlling salary or benefit costs.

In an effort to establish greater uniformity and a measure of control over state expenditures for teacher salaries without usurping authority and control from local school boards, this resolve directs the Department of Administrative and Financial Services to develop a plan for the transition of public school teachers from local school employees to employees of the State beginning July 1, 1995. The resolve requires that the department develop all legislation needed to implement the transition for consideration during the First Regular Session of the 117th Legislature.

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
