Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the do not become effective Legislature 90 until days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

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State's welfare system contains too many Whereas, the disincentives to achieve self-sufficiency goals and avoid revolving-door dependency on aid to families with dependent children; and Barte de P

Whereas, children and families are stigmatized and demoralized by the system despite their positive efforts andachievements; and

Whereas, the system fails to capitalize on the desire of the vast majority of aid to families with dependent children families for decent work, training or education opportunities; and

Whereas, the State's public and private job training, rehabilitation, education, parent training and child-care agencies exist to meet these needs and should become the primary 20 providers of services leading to self-sufficiency for needy families; and

Whereas, the public has lost confidence in the present system; and

Whereas, the new administration in Washington, D.C. will 28 likely entertain proposals to radically reform welfare early in the new term; and

Whereas, the State's budget crisis requires that the State take immediate steps to explore all avenues to reduce welfare 32 dependency and its associated costs in a humane and productive manner; and 34

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts 36 create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of 38 Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it 40

Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Commission to Examine Alternatives to Maine's Welfare System is established; and be it further

Sec. 2. Commission membership. Resolved: That the commission consists of the following 17 members: 6 members appointed by the Governor, 2 members from the Department of Human Services, one member from the Department of Education, one member from the Department of Labor and a chair representing the public; 3 members appointed by the President of the Senate, 2 of whom may be Senators, one member from the Joint Standing Committee on

Human Resources, one member from the Joint Standing Committee on Education and one member representing the public; 3 members appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives, 2 of whom may be Representatives, one member from the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources, one member from the Joint Standing Committee on Education and one member representing the public; one member of the public jointly appointed by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives; one member designated by the Aid to Families with Dependent Children Advisory Committee; one member designated by Coastal Enterprises, Inc. of Maine; one member designated by the Maine Association of Interdependent Neighborhoods; one member designated by the Maine Municipal Association; and be it further

16 Sec. 3. Appointments; meetings. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the 18 effective date of this resolve. The chair shall call the first meeting of the commission; and be it further

Sec. 4. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall explore with appropriate state and federal agencies an alternative to Maine's aid to families with dependent children system that will meet the goals of the State for needy children and families and provide for:

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1. Timely and adequate response to basic needs;

2. Enrollment in a goal-oriented training program leading 30 to self-sufficiency and adequate child care; and

3. Financial assistance as a supporting element for the goal-oriented program; and be it further

Sec. 5. Goals. Resolved: That the goals of the commission are to:

 Identify barriers to self-sufficiency among the aid to families with dependent children population and determine how to
replace the existing system with a goal-oriented program promoting optimum levels of financial independence and family
stability;

44 2. Utilize existing work, training, education. social rehabilitation and service agencies to administer self-sufficiency programs, as primary service providers; 46

3. Customize existing federally matched public assistance and social services to support goal-oriented training programs during periods of enrollment; and

4. Continue the existing medical assistance programs for medically needy families, irrespective of their status in self-sufficiency programs; and be it further assistance.

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Sec. 6. Alternatives. Resolved: That the commission consider the following alternatives:

1. Determine to what extent the system, or components of the system, may operate without Federal Government waivers; and

2. Determine the waivers needed to implement the program or to demonstrate the feasibility and cost benefits of a goal-oriented, financial assistance program; and be it further

Sec. 7. Role of state agencies. Resolved: That the commission shall consider the administration, service and case-management functions of the participating agencies to ensure that certain conditions are met. The operating principles guiding these conditions must include:

 Prompt, efficient and sensitive handling of all financial assistance applications;

24 2. The needs of children in arranging for self-sufficiency program enrollments;

3. The use of casework skills and principles of 28 self-determination in helping applicants select а self-sufficiency program;

Interviewing and case-management skills employed by the
participating service agencies; and

34 5. Adequate financial assistance to maintain the family during periods of enrollment and transition at optimum levels of 36 self-sufficiency or parenting; and be it further

38 Sec. 8. Pilot project. Resolved: That the commission shall investigate the desirability and feasibility of demonstrating the recommended alternative system in one or more regions of the Department of Human Services; and be it further

Sec. 9. Process. Resolved: That, in conducting the study, the commission may:

46 1. Employ brainstorming approaches;

48 2. Employ negotiation and conflict resolution techniques; and 50

3. Utilize the services of a facilitator; and be it further

Sec. 10. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the commission may request staff assistance from state agencies as the commission considers appropriate; and be it further

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Sec. 11. Report. Resolved: That the commission shall present its findings, together with any recommended legislation, to the First Regular Session of 117th Legislature by March 30, 1995.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

This resolve establishes the Commission to Examine Alternatives to Maine's Welfare System to study enrollment in a goal-oriented training program leading to self-sufficiency and adequate child care and to make recommendations concerning the replacement of the welfare system.
