An Act to Amend the Laws Concerning Massage Therapists.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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- Sec. 1. 32 MRSA §14301, sub-§3, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 403,
 §1, is amended to read:
- 3. Massage therapist or massage practitioner. "Massage therapist" or "massage practitioner" means a person who provides or offers to provide massage therapy for a fee, monetary or otherwise. This definition includes the use of different forms of the term "massage therapist" or "massage practitioner," such as "masseuse" or "masseur."

 §1, is amended to read:
 - 7. Advisory council. The commissioner, as necessary, may select members of the profession and other interested parties to serve on an advisory council to advise and consult with the commissioner concerning the regulation of massage therapists and massage practitioners. Service on the council is not in itself a conflict of interest regardless of the occupations or associations of the members.

 postmarked later than the anniversary date of the individual's initial registration. If, after 90 days from the anniversary date, an individual has not renewed the registration, the individual must reapply for registration.

20	1. Grounds. The commissioner may suspend, revoke or refuse

\$14310. Home rule

Nothing in this chapter prohibits a municipality from adopting or enforcing an ordinance that regulates massage massage practitioners or massage therapists. If a municipality adopts such an ordinance, an individual must comply with the provisions of this chapter and any provision of the local ordinance that is more restrictive than this chapter.

Sec. 10. 32 MRSA §14311 is enacted to read:

\$14311. Reciprocity

Reciprocity is granted to individuals from other states as long as they meet the requirements of this chapter for status as certified massage therapists or registered massage practitioners and show proof of current certification or registration from their states.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill expands the definition of massage therapist to include massage practitioner and imposes certain requirements for the certification and registration of both. The bill requires massage therapists, who under existing law must be registered, to certified 1994. effective January 1, Certification requirements include passing a national certification examination or graduation from a school of massage therapy accredited by the American Massage Therapy Association. Massage practitioners, however, must meet the qualifications currently required for massage therapists except that the required physician's certificate need not be issued by a physician licensed within

this State and the health standards for the issuance of a certificate are changed.

4 This bill also:

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- 6 l. Repeals existing provisions that disallow the registration of any individual whose certification or registration has been revoked;
- 2. Makes administrative changes relative to registration and certification by changing expiration dates, assessing \$10 late fees in certain applications and requiring reapplication 90 days after a registration or certification has lapsed; and
- 3. Adds reciprocity provisions to allow certified massage therapists and registered massage practitioners from other states to practice in this State.
