2	Sec. 1. 21-A MRSA §601, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 161, §6, is

12	The Secretary of State shall prepare the primary election ballots according to the following provisions.

; 16	1. Arrangement. The ballot must be arranged in one column.
	2. Content. The ballot must contain the things listed in
18	this section. It may contain no others.
20	A. The following instructions must be printed in bold type
22	at the top of the ballot: "MAKE A CROSS (X) OR A CHECK MARK ( ) IN THE SQUARE AT THE LEFT OF THE NAME OF THE CANDIDATE
	FOR WHOM YOU WISH TO VOTE. YOU MAY VOTE FOR A PERSON WHOSE
24	NAME DOES NOT APPEAR ON THE BALLOT BY WRITING IT OR PASTING A STICKER WITH THE PERSON'S NAME AND MUNICIPALITY OF
