STATE OF MAINE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES 116TH LEGISLATURE FIRST REGULAR SESSION

HOUSE AMENDMENT " \mathcal{D} " to S.P. 535, L.D. 1561, Bill, "An Act to Collect Baseline Data to Facilitate Health Care Reform"

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16 Amend the bill by striking out everything after the enacting clause and before the emergency clause and inserting in its place 18 the following:

'Sec. 1. Baseline data collection. The Joint Standing Committee on Banking and Insurance, referred to in this Act as the committee, shall conduct a study to collect baseline data on health care.

Sec. 2. Duties. The committee shall hold meetings, ask 26 questions and receive data on health care from a broad range of interested parties invited to present information the to 28 committee. The committee shall seek answers, including the direct and indirect costs and cost trends, to the following 30 questions about health care and any other information that the committee considers important to the charge of the committee.

 What services are being provided by hospitals and at what cost? How could service be provided in the future and at what cost and what savings? How are hospitals financed?

2. What services are being provided by health care 38 providers, including but not limited to physicians, chiropractors, mental health and allied health professionals, 40 other health professionals and health clinics and centers and at what cost? What services could be provided in the future and at 42 what cost?

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3. What services are being provided by present programs on the state and federal levels and at what cost? What services could be provided in the future and at what cost?

4. What is the cost of health care services now? What will they cost in the future? Who pays what amounts, directly and indirectly?

5. What does medical malpractice cost? What could it cost in the future? Are there recent changes in costs and practices?

6. What is the data on health care access, geographic and demographic? What could the situation be in the future?

7. What is the health care situation of uninsured persons? What are the costs of service to uninsured persons and are savings possible? What are the unmet health care needs of the people of the State? What are the costs of meeting unmet needs and are savings possible?

8. What are the costs of prescription drugs and what could the costs be in the future? Are changes possible in the provision of and payment for prescription drugs?

9. What are the costs of long-term care and what could the costs be in the future? Are changes possible in the provision of and payment for long-term care?

10. What are the costs of home health care and what could 30 the cost be in the future? Are changes possible in the provision of and payment for home health care?

11. What are the status, present role and future of 34 preventive care? What is the impact on health care, access and cost of preventive care?

12. What is the status, present role and future of cost
38 control methods, including but not limited to volume and intensity controls, primary care case management, centralized and
40 uniform billing, claims processing and utilization review? What is the impact of these factors on health care, access and cost?

13. What are the present role and future of health care treatment patterns? What is the impact of these patterns on health care, access and cost?

14. What are the costs of workers' compensation medical services and what could the costs be in the future? What is their impact on health care, access and costs? What could be the financial impact of combining the workers' compensation medical

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system with the health care system? Could there be an effect on workers' compensation litigation from providing health care regardless of cause?

What are the costs of auto insurance medical services 15. 6 and what could the costs be in the future? What is the impact on health care, access and cost? What could be the financial impact of combining the auto insurance medical system with the medical system?

What are the costs of other insurance medical services 16. and what could the costs be in the future? What is their impact on health care, access and costs? What could be the financial impact of combining the other insurance medical system with the health care system?

Sec. 3. Meetings. The committee shall hold its first meeting 18 on or before July 22, 1993 in Augusta and shall hold meetings at least once a month in Augusta until December 15, 1993. A11 meetings must be public meetings and include setting the agenda 20 for the next meeting and identifying the parties to be invited to provide data to the committee. 22

Sec. 4. Powers. The committee may receive grants and hire The committee shall request staffing assistance consultants. from the Legislative Council. Consultation, information and assistance must be provided as required by the Maine Health Care Finance Commission, the Bureau of Insurance, the Department of Administrative and Financial Services, the Department of Human Services, the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and the Workers' Compensation Board.

Sec. 5. Reimbursement. The members of the committee are 34 entitled to reimbursement for their expenses for the days of attendance at meetings upon request from the Executive Director 36 of the Legislative Council, who shall administer the budget of the committee.

Sec. 6. Funding. The Legislative Council may seek funding for the committee from outside sources and foundations. The Legislative Council may authorize the committee to develop funding proposals. Acceptance of outside funds obtained by the committee requires the review and approval of the Legislative Council.

Sec. 7. Appropriation. The following funds are appropriated from the General Fund to carry out the purposes of this Act.

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The committee is charged with asking questions and receiving data on health care from a broad range of interested parties invited to present information to the committee. The committee is directed to meet at least once a month from July 23, 1993 to December 15, 1993. The committee is authorized to apply for and receive grants and hire consultants and to request staffing assistance from the Legislative Council.

An appropriation pays for expenses for meetings and costs for photocopying, mailing and printing.
