_	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 32 MRSA §1861, sub-§2, as amended by PL 1979, c. 731, §19, is further amended to read:
6	2. Intent. It is the intent of the Legislature to create
8	incentives for the manufacturers, distributors, dealers and consumers of beverage containers to reuse or recycle beverage containers thereby removing the blight on the landscape caused by
10	the disposal of these containers on the highways and lands of the State and reducing the increasing costs of litter collection and
12	municipal solid waste disposal.

50	Sec. 7. Transition provisions. The Maine Waste Management Agency is the successor in every way to the powers, duties and

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functions of the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources regarding implementation of the returnable container law in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 32, chapter 28. All existing rules and procedures in effect regarding the returnable container law continue in effect until rescinded or revised by the Maine Waste Management Agency. All existing contracts, agreements and compacts currently in effect in the department regarding that law continue in effect. All records, property and equipment of the department used solely in implementing the returnable container law become property of the Maine Waste Management Agency.

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- Sec. 8. Maine Revised Statutes amended; revision clause. Wherever in Title 32, sections 1861 to 1872 the word "department" appears or reference is made to that word, it is amended to read and mean "agency" and wherever in those sections the word "commissioner" appears or reference is made to that word, it is amended to read and mean "director" and the Revisor of Statutes shall implement this revision when updating, publishing or republishing the statutes.
- Sec. 9. Study. The Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Resources shall conduct a study of moving all food that department to improve inspection functions into efficiency of food safety inspections in the State. shall include a review of the pros and cons of consolidating inspection of eating establishments by the Department of Human Services under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 22, chapter 562 and inspection of wholesale and retail seafood licensees by the Department of Marine Resources under Title 12, chapter 625 with existing inspection functions in the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. The commissioner shall consult with the Department of Human Resources and the Department of Marine Resources in conducting the study and shall submit the results of study, including financial analysis and any recommended legislation, to the joint standing committees of the Legislature having jurisdiction over agriculture, human resource and marine resource matters by January 15, 1995.
- Sec. 10. Plan to improve inspection functions. The Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources shall review the department's administration of the food inspection program and shall plan for improvements to the program, including, where feasible, the following:
- 1. Cross-training of all department inspectors to permit enforcement of multiple laws through single inspections;

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	2. Improving access to training and skills improvement
2	programs for inspectors, including the use of teleconference training;
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	3. Revising the inspection program to require fewer
6	inspections for retail food establishments with good to excellent inspection reports; and
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	4. Continuing and expanding the self-inspection pilot
10	program and programs to educate retail food establishments about food safety.
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14	STATEMENT OF FACT
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	This bill moves administration of the returnable container
18	law, know as the "bottle bill" from the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources to the Maine Waste
20	Management Agency. The bill also requires the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources to study consolidation of
22	all food inspection functions within the department. Finally, the bill requires the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural
24	Resources to plan for improvements in the department's food inspection program.
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32	This document has not yet been reviewed to determine the need for cross-reference, stylistic and other technical
34	amendments to conform existing law to current drafting standards.
