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Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §17102, sub-§8, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 801, §§5 and 7, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

- 8. Legal advisor. The board shall provide for its own legal services, whether from the Attorney General's office, through the appointment of a general counsel or the employment of private legal counsel, or a combination of these, as it determines necessary.
- Sec. 2. 5 MRSA §17105, sub-§3, as repealed and replaced by PL 1993, c. 410, Pt. L, §23, is amended to read:

3. Staff. The executive director shall employ personnel as 16 necessary and in accordance with board policy to transact the business of the system. The executive director may also employ 18 technical and legal experts and may provide for the legal services required by staff, whether from the Attorney General's office, through the employment of staff attorneys or private 20 legal counsel, or a combination of these, as the executive 22 director determines necessary. The Attorney General's office, board's general counsel, any staff attorney or private counsel or any combination thereof may represent the board of trustees or 24 its staff in any forum, proceeding, investigation or trial.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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Currently, the laws governing the Maine State Retirement System require that the Attorney General or an assistant attorney general designated by the Attorney General serve as legal advisor to the Board of Trustees of the Maine State Retirement System. Current law also requires that the Attorney General approve the system's use of private counsel. This bill allows the board of trustees to use the services of the Attorney General's office, appoint a general counsel or employ private legal counsel, or use a combination of these resources, to meet its legal needs. It also allows for the executive director to provide legal services to the system by using the services of the Attorney

2	General's office, by employing staff attorneys or private legal counsel, or any combination thereof.
