Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §1724, sub-\$1, as amended by PL 1993, c. 11, \$1, is further amended to read:

All Authorization. of the affairs of a disposal district must be managed by an appointed board of directors that consists of not less than 3 directors. The exact number of directors must be determined in accordance with section 1721. numberof Each director entitled to the is corresponds to the level of population in that director's municipality as set forth in the following table, unless an alternative method of apportioning votes is approved by majority vote of the municipal officers representing each member of the disposal district prior to or at the time of formation.

A director may not split votes. In the event a municipality has more than one director, directors from that municipality shall share equally the number of votes for that municipality. determination of population must be made based upon the latest official Decennial Census of the United States by the United A disposal district may alter the States Bureau of Census. number of its directors by submitting the proposed alteration to the voters in the same manner as provided in section 1721, subsection 7. No municipality within any disposal district may have less than one director. A quorum of the directors may conduct the affairs of the district even if there is a vacancy on the board of directors. A quorum is defined as a simple majority of eligible and appointed directors, provided that a majority of the member municipalities are represented. A simple majority of directors present--and voting, either in person or by written consent, may conduct the affairs of the district.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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	This bill allows the board of directors of a refuse disposal
