Sec. B-4. Duties. The task force is directed to make recommendations regarding the establishment of a school for the arts, to be located in the greater Portland area and to develop an implementation plan for the school. The plan must include a curriculum component that provides the opportunity for study in the visual arts, including graphics, ceramics, crafts, sculpture and painting; the media arts, including advertising, television, film and photography; dance; theater; music; and creative writing. The plan must also provide for a program of instruction that meets the curriculum requirements and the high school diploma standards pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, chapter 207-A, for 11th and 12th grade students. The plan must also include, but is not limited to, the following other components:

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- 1. The policy-making authority and governing body of the school;
- 22 2. Administration and staffing;
 - Student selection procedures;
- 26 4. Tuition;
- Transportation and housing;
- 30 6. Capital and operational budgets;
- 32 7. Funding provisions and sources; and
- 34 8. The role of the school as a statewide resource in arts education.

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Sec. B-5. Staff assistance. The Department of Education shall provide necessary technical assistance and staff support to the task force.

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Sec. B-6. Compensation. The members of the task force are not entitled to per diem, but those members who are not state employees may be reimbursed for expenses, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 12002, upon application to the Executive Director of the Legislative Council for those expenses.

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Sec. B-7. Funding. The task force is authorized to accept funds and may contract for services in carrying out the duties set forth in section B-4.

Sec. B-8. Report. The task force shall present its report together with any implementing legislation to the Governor, the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters and the Executive Director of the Legislative Council by December 15, 1994.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

10 Part A of the bill establishes the Maine School of Science and Mathematics. The school is intended to provide certain 12 high-achieving high school students with an intensive curriculum emphasis in math and science. The school will be located in 14 Limestone and will serve students from throughout the State. Students from other states and countries may attend on a space-available basis.

Part B of the bill establishes a task force to develop a plan for a school for the visual and performing arts to open in September of 1996 in the greater Portland area. The task force shall present its plan together with any recommended legislation to the Governor and the Executive Director of the Legislative Council by December 15, 1994.

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This document has not yet been reviewed to determine the need for cross-reference, stylistic and other technical amendments to conform existing law to current drafting standards.
