Resolve, Requiring the State to Fulfill Its Commitment to Provide Adequate Mental Health Services for Senior Citizens in the Eastern Maine Area.

Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts and resolves of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and

Whereas, in the Policy Directive for Privatization dated November 17, 1991, the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation set forth a plan to privatize beds at the Program on Aging, a multiunit facility caring for psychiatic-geriatric patients on the Bangor Mental Health Institute campus. The policy directive pledged that the existing bed capacity would be developed in the eastern Maine community to replace beds eliminated at the Program on Aging. The department specified that care at these facilities would be of the highest quality. On August 21, 1992 the department sought a contract for 71 specialized nursing beds in the eastern Maine community; and

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Whereas, on February 13, 1992 the State closed down a unit of 15 beds at the Program on Aging; another unit of 15 beds closed on May 20, 1993; another unit of 15 beds closed on May 5, 1994. Despite the commitment expressly stated in the Policy Directive for Privatization dated November 17, 1991, no beds were opened in the community to replace the lost 45 beds; and

Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety; now, therefore, be it

Sec. 1. Community mental health resources in greater Bangor area. Resolved: That the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, Division of Mental Health is required to fulfill its commitment to provide adequate mental health services for senior citizens in the greater Bangor area through the identification of community mental health resources.

1. Persons to be served. The resources must be sufficient to serve 45 persons who are eligible for services under the Program on Aging at the Bangor Mental Health Institute.

2. Quality of care. The resources must be sufficient to provide care that is equal to or better than the quality of care available from the Program on Aging.

3. Submission of report. By March 1, 1995, the Division of Mental Health must submit to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over human resource matters a report that specifies the method by which the resources will be under contract by May 1, 1995, and any necessary legislation and appropriations to fund those resources.

- 2 **4. Performance.** The resources must be documented in a contract or contracts with the Division of Mental Health by May 1, 1995; and be it further
 - Sec. 2. Resources at Bangor Mental Health Institute. Resolved:
 That the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation,
 Division of Mental Health is required to fulfill its commitment
 to provide adequate mental health resources for senior citizens
 in the greater Bangor area through the restoration of resources
 at the Bangor Mental Health Institute.
 - 1. Conditions precedent. The resources must be developed under this section only if the resources required under section 1 are not identified and contracts are not made in accordance with that section.
- 2. Persons to be served. The resources must be sufficient to serve 45 persons who are eligible for services under the Program on Aging.
 - 3. Submission of report. By May 1, 1995, the Division of Mental Health must submit to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over human resource matters a report that specifies the manner in which the resources will be available on July 1, 1995, and any necessary legislation and appropriations to fund those resources.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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This emergency resolve requires the Department of Mental Health and Retardation, Division of Mental Health to fulfill the commitment of the State to provide adequate mental health resources for senior citizens in the greater Bangor area that was made in the Policy Directive for Privatization dated November 17, 1991 and pursuant to which funds for 45 beds at the Bangor Mental Health Institute were deappropriated. Ιt requires identification of community mental health resources for 45 persons eligible for services under the Program on Aging at the Bangor Mental Health Institute by May 1, 1995. A report is due to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources by March 1, The quality of the resources must be equal to or better than the resources available from the Program on Aging.

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If community mental health resources are not identified and contracts entered into by the Division of Mental Health

- by May 1, 1995, on that date the division must submit a report to the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources to provide for the restoration of resources at the Bangor Mental Health
- Institute for 45 persons eligible for services under the Program on Aging. The report must include legislation and appropriations
- 6 to fund those resources as of July 1, 1995.
