This bill requires the Board of Environmental Protection to ensure that the Passamaquoddy Tribe and the Penobscot Indian Nation are made aware of proposals that affect their fish stocks and other natural resources, to solicit input from the tribes about such proposals, and to ensure that the rights of individual tribal members, provided for under the Maine Indian Claims Settlement, are not diminished.
