Provides funds to cover the costs of revising the minimum wage poster.

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Sec. 3. Statutory referendum procedure; submission at statewide
election; form of question; effective date. This Act must be submitted to the legal voters of the State of Maine at a statewide election
held on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November following passage of this Act. The municipal officers of this
State shall notify the inhabitants of their respective cities, towns and plantations to meet, in the manner prescribed by law
for holding a statewide election, to vote on the acceptance or rejection of this Act by voting on the following question:

"Do you favor increasing the minimum wage to \$4.50 per hour, effective January 1, 1996; \$4.75 per hour, effective January 1, 1997; and \$5.00 per hour, effective January 1, 1998?"

The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall vote by ballot on this question, and shall designate their choice 20 by a cross or check mark placed within a corresponding square below the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots must be received, 22 sorted, counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same 24 manner as votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor 26 shall review the returns and, if it appears that a majority of the legal votes are cast in favor of the Act, the Governor shall 28 proclaim that fact without delay, and the Act takes effect 30 days after the date of the proclamation.

The Secretary of State shall prepare and furnish to each 32 city, town and plantation all ballots, returns and copies of this Act necessary to carry out the purpose of this referendum.'

HOUSE AMENDMENT 'C' to COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "B" to H.P. 108, L.D. 143

This amendment adds a referendum requirement. The estimated cost of sending this question out to referendum will vary according to the total number of referenda enacted during the First Regular Session of the 117th Legislature. The estimated cost to the Secretary of State if one to 6 referenda are enacted is \$95,000. Each additional referendum costs an additional \$7,000.

If approved by the voters, this amendment would amend the state minimum wage and place additional responsibilities on the Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Standards in the area of required distribution of posters. A General Fund appropriation of \$11,259 in fiscal year 1995-96 would be required for publishing costs and other operating expenses related to revising the minimum wage poster.

The increases in the minimum wage may result in increased 18 costs to municipalities if there are school and other public employees who are compensated at less than the higher minimum 20 wage levels. Increased school expenses may increase funding requests for the General Purpose Aid for Local Schools program.' 22

## STATEMENT OF FACT
