2	Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
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	Whereas, the private sector should be encouraged to provide
6	goods and services, traditionally provided by State Government, when they can do so at a comparable quality and lower cost; and

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- Sec. 4. Appointments. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 30 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council upon making their appointments. When the appointment of all members is complete, the chair of the Legislative Council shall call and convene the first meeting of the council no later than June 1, 1995; and be it further
- Sec. 5. State government cooperation. Resolved: That agencies of State Government shall fully cooperate with the council and its staff in the provision of information and data as may be requested and required to accomplish the council's responsibilities; and be it further
 - Sec. 6. Staff support. Resolved: That, subject to appropriation, the council must be provided staff support as needed; and be it further
 - Sec. 7. Reimbursement. Resolved: That the council members who are Legislators are entitled to receive the legislative per diem, as defined in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 3, section 2, for each day's attendance at meetings of the council. All members of the council are entitled to reimbursement for travel and other necessary expenses upon application to the Legislative Council. The Executive Director of the Legislative Council shall administer the council's budget; and be it further

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Sec. 8. Report. Resolved: That the council shall issue a final written report to the Governor, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives and report its findings, including any necessary implementing legislation, to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over state and local government matters no later than February 1, 1996.

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Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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This resolve creates the Maine Council on Privatization, which is charged with examining ways in which State Government can use the private sector to deliver certain services currently being provided by the State. The council must submit its final report to the Governor, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives and report its findings, including any necessary legislation, to the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government no later than February 1, 1996.
