§3452.	Requirement for providing nonsewered toilet systems to
	employees and the general public
	loyers and sponsors of special events are required
_	nonsewered toilet systems where sewered toilets
	ient in number or not available. These nonsewered toi
	must be maintained in clean, sanitary and functio
conditio	n according to the standards of this section.
1	Construction. Rooms, shelters or buildings hous
	must be of solid construction, easy to clean and prov
	and privacy. The toilet room must be ventilated to

	outside and have a latch on the inside to prevent inadvertent
2	entry. Open vents must be covered with 16-mesh screen.
4	2. Waste containers. Waste containers must be made of an
6	impervious material such as plastic, steel or fiberglass. Containers must be watertight and capable of containing the waste in a sanitary manner.

10	3. Servicing. Servicing must include the use of a cleaning solution for cleaning urinals and seats, removing waste from
12	containers, recharging containers with an odor-controlling solution and installing an adequate supply of toilet tissue.
14	<b>4. Defective units.</b> Any defective unit must be repaired or withdrawn from service by locking or removing that unit.
16	
18	5. Waste removal. Removal of waste must be done in a clean and sanitary manner by a vacuum hose and the waste received by a leak-proof tank truck. All ports on the tank must be valved and
20	capped.
22	<b>6. Waste disposal.</b> Waste must be disposed of in municipal sanitary sewage systems or permitted septage disposal sites.

26	§3453. Work site requirements
28	The following requirements apply to employers with work sites that do not have adequate numbers of sewered toilets
	available for employees.
30	1. Ratio. An employer must provide at least one toilet
32	facility for every 15 employees at a work site. Separate toilets
34	must be provided for each sex in the same ratio when there are more than 20 employees consisting of both sexes.
36	<b>2. Accessibility.</b> Accessibility to toilet facilities is governed by the following.
38	
40	A. Toilet facilities must be located within 200 feet horizontally of all employees.
42	B. On multistory structures that are work sites, toilet facilities must be located not more than 30 feet vertically
44	from each other when possible.
46	C. At all agricultural hand labor sites, toilet facilities must be located within 1/4 mile of each employee's workplace.

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	3. Multi-employer work sites. The prime contractor on a
2	multi-employer work site must ensure that the requirements of
2	this subchapter are met.
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	4. Exemptions. This section does not apply to mobile crews
6	or to normally unattended work locations if employees are working
	at those locations for less than 3 hours in the course of their
8	duties and have transportation immediately available to nearby
	facilities meeting the requirements of this section.

	<u>§3454. Special event requirements</u>
12	
	The following requirements apply to sponsors of special
14	events that do not have adequate numbers of sewered toilets
	available for the general public attending the special event.
16	
	1. Ratio. Sponsors must provide at least one toilet
18	facility for every 200 members of the general public expected to
	attend the special event, as stated on the mass gathering permit.
20	
	2. Accessibility. The location of nonsewered toilets must
22	be as close as practical to the highest concentration of
	participants, observers and employees at a special event. The
24	sponsors shall consider user safety when determining the location
	for the facilities. Toilet facilities must be accessible for
26	maintenance by truck.
28	§3455. State and local permitting authorities
30	State and local permitting authorities granting permits for
	work sites or special events must require compliance with this
32	subchapter as a condition of granting the permit.
34	§3456. Violation; forfeiture
36	<u>A person that violates this subchapter commits a civil</u>
	violation for which a forfeiture not to exceed \$500 per day may
38	<u>be adjudged.</u>
