	1. Industrial Service Program; establishment. The
Ir	ndustrial Service Program is established in the Office of
	siness Development in the department. Staff is provided at the
	scretion of the commissioner. The Industrial Service Program

	2. Program duties. The duties of the Industrial Service
<u>Pr</u>	ogram include, but are not limited to:
	A. Assisting, upon the request of a private business, in
	alleviating adverse conditions that threaten to cause a
	large loss of employment, plant closure or failure by a
	private business, including, but not limited to,
	site-specific problems, loss of markets, out-moded
	<pre>production technologies, poor management and changes in ownership;</pre>
	<u>ownersnip;</u>
	B. When a large loss of employment, plant closure or
	business failure is unavoidable, assisting efforts to secure
	alternative employment and retraining opportunities for
	displaced workers, including, but not limited to,
	coordinating the delivery of available state and federal
	resources and services;
	C. Assisting, upon the request of local communities
	affected by major plant closures, employment losses or
	business failures, in finding new uses for idled plants or
	facilities and in fostering long-term economic vitality,
	industrial growth and job creation in those communities;
	D. Overseeing an early warning system to identify
	industries and businesses likely to experience large losses
	in employment or plant closures by collecting and analyzing
	information that may include, but is not limited to:
	products and markets experiencing declining growth rates,
	companies and industries subject to competition from other
	states; changes in ownership; layoff and employment
	<pre>patterns; payments of unemployment compensation contributions; and state tax payments; and</pre>
	E. Cooperating with all other state, federal and local
	agencies, departments and commissions, as is necessary to
	carry out its duties and purposes.

- 3. Cooperation with other state agencies. In performing the duties of this section, the Industrial Service Program staff
   may work with the Finance Authority of Maine and the State Planning Office for the following:
- A.Assessing the viability of a business likely to8experience a large loss of employment, plant closure or6failure, and developing an adjustment strategy to keep the10business viable and maintain employment; and
- 12B. Securing new ownership or new management or both<br/>necessary to keep the business in operation as a viable<br/>business and maintain employment.
- 16 On behalf of the Industrial Service Program, the commissioner may contract for private consultants if it is determined that a business is unable to pay for these services or the commissioner can not obtain services of sufficient quality and with sufficient 20 speed from an existing state agency, department, office or other public instrumentality to properly perform the duties.
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4. Documentary materials, data or conversations regarding business operations; not public records. Any documentary 24 materials, data or conversations made or received by any employee of the Industrial Service Program and consisting of, or to the 26 extent that those materials, data or conversations consist of, trade secrets or commercial or financial information regarding 28 the operation of any business conducted by an applicant for 30 assistance that the Industrial Service Program is empowered to render or regarding the competitive position of that applicant in a particular field of endeavor are not public records of the 32 program. 34

- **STATEMENT OF FACT**
- This bill establishes the Industrial Service Program in the 40 Department of Economic and Community Development. The program assists businesses in alleviating adverse conditions that 42 threaten to cause a large loss of employment.
