An Act Relating to Authority of Governing Boards of Consumer-owned Electric Utilities.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows: Sec. 1. 35-A MRSA §3506 is enacted to read: \$3506. Exercise of powers by consumer-owned electric utilities 1. Board composition. If a consumer-owned electric_utility is governed by a board composed of at least 3 members, elected by the customers or voters within its service area, that board may exercise the powers of the Public Utilities Commission under this Title and any other provision of law. Upon deciding to exercise those powers the board shall inform the commission. The commission may continue its consideration of any matter before it upon receipt of notice of the decision. One year after making the decision to exercise those powers, a consumer-owned utility may petition the commission to terminate the exercise of powers under this subsection and is authorized to do so by the commission. 2. Termination of board authority. If 15% of the customers of the consumer-owned electric utility or 1,000 customers, whichever is less, file petitions with the consumer-owned utility and the commission requesting termination of the board's authority to exercise the powers described in subsection 1, the commission may terminate the board's authority if the commission finds that termination is required by those customers. The commission shall notify the electric utility of its decision. The electric utility may challenge the petitions as provided in section 3502, subsection 10.

3. Adoption of rules. The board of a consumer-owned 32 electric utility may adopt rules of the commission concerning electric utilities or any part of those rules for the board's own 34 terms and conditions of service.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill gives consumer-owned electric utilities with 40 elected boards the option to exercise certain powers of the Public Utilities Commission under the Maine Revised Statutes, 42 Title 35-A.

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
