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The Governor Baxter School for the Deaf is established as a public school pursuant to this chapter for the purpose of educating deaf students.

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§7402. Definitions

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- As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
- 12 <u>1. School. "School" means the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf.</u>

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- 2. School board. "School board" means the School Board of the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf.
- 18 3. Sending school. "Sending school" means any school administrative unit that has a student in attendance at the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf.
 - 4. Superintendent. "Superintendent" means the Superintendent of the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf.

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§7403. Location

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The school is located on Mackworth Island.

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§7404. Funding; tuition

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The following provisions apply to funding for and tuition to the school.

1. Funding. Students from this State may attend the school 34 free of tuition and room and board expense. Funding for these students is provided based on the amount necessary to satisfy the 36 individualized education programs of the students, as defined by department rule. Rules adopted pursuant to this subsection are 38 major substantive rules as defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter II-A. Funding must support maintenance of the school 40 and that portion of the island used by the school, security, outreach services, adult education, access to the education 42 network of Maine and operations of the school, including the 44 residential program, parent-infant program, preschool program and communication garden program.

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2. Out-of-state tuition. Students from other states and countries may attend the school on a space-available basis by paying the cost of tuition, fees and room and board as established by the school board.

Authorizing the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf to retain certain fees and reimbursements will result in a loss of General Fund undedicated revenue estimated to be \$12,000 annually. The resulting loss in fiscal year 1996-97 will be approximately \$6,000.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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The amendment does the following.

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- 1. It adds an appropriation section and a fiscal note to the bill.
- 20 2. It permits payment of per diem and expenses for members of the School Board of the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf.

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- 3. It clarifies that funding for the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf must be used to support maintenance of the school and Mackworth Island, security, outreach services, adult education, use of the education network of Maine and operations of the school, including the residential program, parent-infant program, preschool program and the communication garden program.
- 4. It increases the membership of the School Board of the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf from 11 to 13 voting members.

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5. It requires that the Governor give proper consideration to statewide geographical representation, cultural equity and gender equity in appointing members to the school board.

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6. It requires 8 affirmative votes by the school board to approve the annual budget of the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf.

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7. It requires the Department of Education to provide administrative assistance to the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf until July 1, 1999.

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8. It clarifies that the School Board of the Governor Baxter School for the Deaf must annually submit the school budget to the Commissioner of Education for review and inclusion in the department's budget. The budget is subject to the normal budget review process conducted by the Governor and the State Budget Officer.
