26	'Mandate preamble. This measure requires one or more local units of government to expand or modify activities so as to

30	Pursuant to the Constitution of Maine, Article IX, Section 21, two thirds of all of the members elected to each House have

34	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted

Any employee of a public school who fills any position not included in paragraph A, the principal function of which is to introduce new learning to students, except that an employee who is employed in adult education as defined in Title 20-A, section 8601-A, subsection 1 and who is not otherwise covered by the definition of teacher defined in this subsection may not be considered a teacher for purposes of this Part;'

Sec. 4. Application. The exclusion of certain adult education employees from the definition of teacher that is provided by section 1 of this Act applies to those employees who are employed on or after July 1, 1995 in circumstances to which the exclusion applies, regardless of whether an employee has been employed in those circumstances prior to that date. An employee who was employed in those circumstances prior to that date and whose contributions related to that employment are in the Maine State Retirement System on that date may, but is not required to, withdraw those contributions.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this Act takes effect July 1, 1995.'

## FISCAL NOTE

Section 1 of this bill excludes certain noncertified adult education personnel currently participating in the Maine State Retirement System from that participation. Pursuant to the Constitution of Maine, since funds appropriated to the Maine State Retirement System may not be deappropriated in any subsequent action, the savings that will occur will result in an experience gain in the system's unfunded liability applicable to teachers.

Absent the Maine State Retirement System plan, which was paid entirely by an appropriation to the Department of Education, school administrative units will be required to provide Social

Security or another qualified retirement plan to their employees. The additional costs of this state mandate to school administrative units are not expected to be significant. Pursuant to the Mandate Preamble, the two-thirds vote of all members elected to each House exempts the State from the constitutional requirement to fund 90% of the additional, local costs.

The new retirement provisions will also increase the cost of adult education programs provided by school administrative units. Since the State's appropriation for adult education subsidy is proposed to remain at fiscal year 1994-95 levels the increased retirement costs will reduce the amount available for instruction programs. Payment of the Social Security benefits will increase the expenditure base of adult education programs, and may result in future additional General Fund appropriation requests.

Section 2 of the bill clarifies the responsibility for the payment of retirement costs for certain certified adult education teachers, and will avoid potential unbudgeted costs for school administrative units.'

## STATEMENT OF FACT

This amendment replaces language in the bill to clarify the bill's intent to exempt part-time adult education teachers working in positions not requiring certification from the requirement that they be members of the Maine State Retirement System. The amendment also adds a mandate preamble, emergency preamble, emergency clause and fiscal note to the bill.
