34	The bill proposes to amend the definition of "stream" in the mandatory zoning laws and the definition of "river, stream or brook" in the natural resources protection laws.
36	This amendment strikes the provision of the bill relating to
38	the definition of "river, stream or brook" in the natural resources protection laws. The amendment repeals and replaces
40	the current definition.
42	Under the current law, "river, stream or brook" is defined by reference to certain physical characteristics such as the
44	presence of aquatic vegetation and a channel bed devoid of top soil. Under this amendment, "river, stream or brook" is defined
46	as a channel between defined banks and the associated flood plain. "Channel" is further defined by reference to a list of
48	characteristics both physical and cartographic. Under this amendment, a channel exists only if at least 2 of these
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characteristics are present.
