	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2 4	Sec. 1. 38 MRSA §1317, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1979, c. 730, §2, is amended to read:
б	1. Discharge. "Discharge" includes, but is not limited to, any spilling, leaking, pumping, pouring, emitting, disposing,
8	emptying or dumping onto the land or into the water or ambient air. The term "discharge" does not include discharge of
10	substances that are corrosive into a contained area, including a pipe or sewer, if the substances will be treated on the site of
12 14	generation in an elementary neutralization unit as defined under rules adopted pursuant to section 1319-0, subsection 4.
16	Sec. 2. 38 MRSA §1319-O, sub-§4 is enacted to read:
10	4. Elementary neutralization. The board shall adopt rules
18	to define and regulate elementary neutralization units at the
	site of waste generation in the same manner as rules applicable
20	to those units adopted under the federal Resource Conservation Recovery Act, 42 United States Code, Section 6901, et seq., as

24	Sec. 3. Rulemaking. The Board of Environmental Protection shall adopt rules pursuant to the Maine Revised Statutes, Title
26	38, section 1319-O, subsection 4, no later than 90 days after the effective date of this Act.
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30	STATEMENT OF FACT
32	This bill allows treatment of corrosive liquids that are generated on-site in tanks, containers and other devices without
34	the requirements imposed on hazardous waste. These materials are defined as hazardous waste only because they are corrosive. This
36	bill replaces recently adopted requirements with an exemption for corrosive substances identical to that found in current federal
38	regulations.

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
