6. Exceptions. When photographic identification is required, a dispensing pharmacist need not comply with the recording procedures otherwise required under this section if the pharmacist verifies that the photographic identification is already on file for the prescribed patient or the person presenting the prescription on the patient's behalf and the previously recorded photographic identification is cross-referenced electronically or is readily retrievable.

## STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill requires valid photographic identification to be presented by those receiving prescriptions for the most addictive or most frequently abused drugs. It identifies those drugs, defines what constitutes a valid photographic identification card and describes the process that the pharmacist needs to follow.
