Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 35-A MRSA §7101, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1993, c. 4 410, Pt. 000, §1, is amended to read:

- 6 1. Universal service. The Legislature declares and finds that the 50-year effort to bring affordable, universally available telephone service to the public has served the State 8 well; universal telephone service has contributed to the State's 10 economic, social and political integration and development; the public benefits from universal telephone service because each 12 telephone subscriber receives a more valuable service when virtually anyone else in the State can be called; and a 14 significant rate increase may threaten universal service by forcing some Maine people to discontinue their telephone service. 16 It is the policy of the State that telephone service must continue to be universally available, especially to the poor, at affordable rates. §7307. Library access plans

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Notwithstanding any other provision of this Title, the commission shall develop by rule or order before January 1, 1996 one or more library access plans consistent with the provisions of this section. The plans must promote expanded public access

4	libraries to these technologies and networks.
6	1. Options. In adopting any library access plan under this section the commission shall examine at least the following:
8	A. Reduced telephone rates for qualified public libraries;

14	C. Option plans that allow gualified public libraries to:

40	STATEMENT OF FACT
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44	This bill establishes a new state policy to promote public access to new telecommunications technologies and information
46	networks. This bill requires the Public Utilities Commission to develop library access plans to promote affordable public access
48	to advanced telecommunications technologies and networks. The commission is required to consider a variety of options, including:

 telecommunications technologies.

 18 free public access to the telecommunications technologies to which a library plan applies.
