4	Sec. 1. 39-A MRSA §203, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1991, c. 885, Pt. A, §8 and affected by §§9 to 11, is amended to read:
6	1. Compensation while incarcerated. Compensation for incapacity under section 212 or 213 or under any prior workers'
8	compensation laws may not be paid to any person during any period in which that person is a sentenced prisoner in actual execution
10	of a term of incarceration imposed in this State or any other jurisdiction for a criminal offense, except in relation to
12	compensable injuries suffered during incarceration and while the prisoner is:

16	A. Employed by a private employer;
10	B. Participating in a work release program;

20	C. Sentenced to imprisonment with intensive supervision under Title 17-A, section 1261; or
22	D. Employed in a program established under a certification issued by the United States Department of Justice under 18

26	Sec. 2. Application. Notwithstanding Public Law 1991, chapter 885, Part A, section 10, the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 39-A,

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill applies retroactively the law prohibiting payment of workers' compensation benefits to incarcerated persons to payments under any prior workers' compensation laws.
