	Emergency preamble. Whereas, Acts of the Legislature do not
2	become effective until 90 days after adjournment unless enacted as emergencies; and
4	Whereas, the Maine Committee on Global Education is
6	scheduled to sunset on June 30, 1995; and
8	Whereas, authorization of the committee should continue without interruption; and

12	Whereas, the activities required by this Act must begin before 90 days after adjournment of the legislative session; and
14	Whereas, in the judgment of the Legislature, these facts create an emergency within the meaning of the Constitution of
16	Maine and require the following legislation as immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and

serve for terms of 3 years. Members may be reappointed and
vacancies must be filled by the appointing authority for the
remainder of the vacant term.
4. Chair; cochair. The committee shall choose a chair and
a cochair from among its members.

5. Quorum. A majority of the committee constitutes a
quorum.
