- Sec. 1. Commission established. Resolved: That the Commission to Study the Effects of Maine's Aging Population, referred to in this resolve as the "commission," is established; and be it further
- Sec. 2. Members. Resolved: That the commission consists of 15 members as follows: one Senator from the Joint Standing Committee on Human Resources, appointed by the President of the Senate; 3 Representatives from the Joint Standing Committee on 10 Human Resources, appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; one representative of the Department of Human Services, appointed by the Commissioner of Human Services; 10 12 representatives of the general public. 4 of whom are appointed by the Governor, 3 of whom are appointed by the President of the 14 Senate and 3 of whom are appointed by the Speaker of the House of 16 Representatives; and be it further
- Sec. 3. Organizational meeting. Resolved: That all appointments must be made no later than 14 days following the effective date of this resolve. The appointing authorities shall notify the Executive Director of the Legislative Council upon making their appointments. The commission shall hold an organizational meeting, called by the Chair of the Legislative Council, within 30 days of the effective date of this resolve and shall elect from among its members a chair and a vice-chair for the commission; and be it further
- Sec. 4. Duties. Resolved: That the commission shall study the effects of the aging population of this State, including, but not limited to, the following:
- 2. Whether the health care facilities in this State, including hospitals, nursing homes, boarding homes and all types of assisted-living facilities, are prepared to accommodate the anticipated increase in the elderly population;
- 40 3. Whether the Medicare and Medicaid programs are positioned to meet the needs of the State's elderly population; 42 and
- 4. Whether there will be enough workers to fill anticipated job openings in this State, especially those in the field of elder health care; and be it further
- Sec. 5. Staff assistance. Resolved: That the State Planning Office and the Department of Human Services shall provide research, clerical and computer assistance to the commission; and be it further

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	Sec. 6. Reimbursement; mileage. Resolved: That the members of
2	the commission are not entitled to reimbursement for expenses or
	legislative per diem, except that members are entitled to
4	reimbursement for mileage upon application to the Executive
	Director of the Legislative Council; and be it further
