- Sec. 1. Study. Resolved: That the Public Utilities
  Commission, referred to in this resolve as the "commission,"
  shall conduct a study of the electric utility industry for the
  following purposes:
  - To provide for an orderly transition to a more economically efficient and competitive market for electricity;
- 2. To establish standards and procedures for consideration 10 by the Legislature and the commission of measures necessary to effectuate such a transition;

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- 3. To eliminate or reduce regulation unnecessary for the protection of consumer and investor interests as the market for electricity becomes more competitive and to promote the efficiency and fairness of any remaining regulations of electric utilities; and
- 4. To ensure the continued reliability of the electrical system; and be it further

## Sec. 2. Findings. Resolved: That the Legislature finds:

- 24 1. A reliable and efficient electric utility industry structure is vital to the growth of the state economy and the well-being of its citizens;
- 28 2. Markets for electricity are becoming increasingly competitive nationally and within the region;
- 3. There is a growing national debate as to whether restructuring of the electric utility industry may be desirable to remove impediments to more effective competition within the industry and whether greater competition is compatible with protecting electrical system reliability and efficiency, shareholder and consumer interests and the environment and the economy;
  - 4. Failure to provide for an orderly transition to increased competition in the market for electricity will result in unnecessary harm to consumer and shareholder interest and may prevent all citizens and businesses of the State from enjoying the full potential benefits of effective competition equitably;
- 5. Providing for an orderly transition to increased competition requires careful consideration, with full opportunity for public participation, of possible changes to the structure of the electric utility industry and of the system of electric utility regulation; and

6. In order to prevent arbitrary competitive disadvantages to electric utilities in the State, any change in the State's electric utility industry structure must be undertaken with due regard for the structures of other utilities in the region; and be it further

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- Sec. 3. Commission investigation. Resolved: That the commission shall investigate the issues associated with the orderly transition to a more competitive market for electricity. In its investigation, the commission shall take into account the purposes identified in section 1 and the findings of fact in section 2 when addressing at least the following:
- 1. The potential of structural changes to the electric utility industry and changes to the system of electric utility regulation to remove impediments to increased economic efficiency while protecting electrical system reliability and efficiency, ratepayer and shareholder interests, the environment and the economy;
- 2. The means by which desirable changes in electric industry structure and the system of electric utility regulation should be phased in or accompanied by interim measures to avoid harm to consumer or shareholder interests;
- 3. To the extent that changes in the electric utility industry structure or regulations are found to be desirable, measures to ensure that those changes are not implemented in a manner that violates the constitutional rights of utility shareholders or otherwise diminishes the value of existing shareholder investments through forced sales of utility assets, allowance of bypass or failure to provide reasonable mechanisms for recovery of costs prudently incurred in fulfilling a utility's obligation to serve;
  - 4. Mechanisms to ensure that costs incurred pursuant to legal or regulatory obligations are recovered in a manner that avoids distortions between competing suppliers of electricity;
  - 5. Means to ensure that the openness of the State's electricity market to out-of-state suppliers is conditioned on reciprocal rights of access for suppliers located in the State;
  - 6. How any aspects of electric utility systems that remain monopolistic should be regulated to protect consumers, ensure economic efficiency and avoid unnecessary regulatory burdens;
- 7. Whether and to what extent utilities should continue to have a legal obligation to provide service; and

This resolve requires the Public Utilities Commission to investigate the issues associated with the orderly transition to a more competitive market for electricity. In the course of this investigation, the Public Utilities Commission must hold at least 4 public hearings throughout the State. The Public Utilities Commission is required to report its findings to the Legislature by October 1, 1998.

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
