An Act to Amend the Bidding Process for School Construction Purposes.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §1743-A, as amended by PL 1989, c. 700, Pt. A, §17, is further amended to read:

6 §1743-A. Competitive bids; advertisement

Any contract for the construction, major alteration or 8 repair of school buildings involving a total cost in excess of 10 \$100,000, except contracts for professional, architectural and engineering services, shall must be awarded by competitive bids. 12 The school district directors, school committee, building committee or whatever agency has responsibility for the 14 construction, major alteration repair shall, or after consultation with the Director of the Bureau of Publie 16 Improvements General Services, seek sealed proposals. Sealed proposals shall must be addressed to the responsible agency and shall must remain sealed until publicly opened in the presence of 18 the responsible agency or a committee thereof at such time as the responsible agency may direct. Competitive bids may be waived in 20 individual cases involving unusual circumstances with the written 22 approval of the Director of the Bureau of Public--Improvements General Services and the Commissioner of Education. The agency that has the responsibility for the construction, major 24 alteration or repair may accept a bid that is not the lowest bid 26 if the agency finds that the bid meets the needs of the agency more appropriately.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

32 This bill permits the acceptance of a bid that is not the lowest bid for school construction, major alteration or repair if 34 the agency responsible for the project finds that the higher bid meets the needs of the agency more appropriately.
