Resolve, to Require the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to Remove Deer from Marsh Island.

Sec. 1. Removal of deer from Marsh Island. Resolved: That the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife shall remove a number of deer from Marsh Island and transport these deer to that portion of the State located within the following bounds: beginning at the west shore of the Penobscot River from the State Highway #15 bridge in Bangor; then following the west shore of the Penobscot River northerly to the Lincoln Access Road bridge in Mattamiscontis Twp: then following the Lincoln Access Road easterly to the State Highway #6 in Lincoln; then following State Highway #6 easterly to the Maine-New Brunswick border in then following the Maine-New Brunswick border Vanceboro; southerly to Stoney Brook in Baileyville; then following the west shore of Stoney Brook southwesterly to State Highway #9; then following State Highway #9 westerly to State Highway #15 in Brewer; then following State Highway #15 westerly to the point of beginning. The deer removed by the department must be of a sufficient number to reduce the current hazards caused by overpopulation in the deer community. The removal must take place within 90 days of the effective date of this resolve; and be it further

Sec. 2. Report. Resolved: That, within 30 days of completing the removal, the department shall submit a report to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over inland fisheries and wildlife matters. The report must include the number of deer removed, the approximate number of deer remaining on Marsh Island and the method or methods used to capture and transport the deer.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This resolve requires the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife to remove enough deer from Marsh Island to reduce the hazards caused by overpopulation of the deer herds. The deer must be released into the area that is currently defined by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife as District 9 in the any-deer permit system.
