RESOLUTION, Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Maine to Provide for Runoff Elections.

Constitutional amendment. Resolved: Two thirds of each branch of the Legislature concurring, that the following amendment to the Constitution of Maine be proposed:

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Constitution, Art. IV. Part First, §5 is amended to read:

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Section 5. Election of Representatives; lists of votes delivered forthwith; lists of votes examined by Governor; summons of persons who appear to be elected; lists shall be laid before The meetings within this State for the choice of Representatives shall be warned in due course of law by qualified officials of the several towns and cities 7 days at least before the election, and the election officials of the various towns and cities shall preside impartially at such meetings, receive the votes of all the qualified electors, sort, count and declare them in open meeting; and a list of the persons voted for shall be formed, with the number of votes for each person against that person's name. Cities and towns belonging to any Representative District shall hold their meetings at the same time in the respective cities and towns; and such meetings shall be notified, held and regulated, the votes received, sorted, counted and declared in the same manner. Fair copies of the lists of votes shall be attested by the municipal officers and the clerks of the cities and towns and the city and town clerks respectively shall cause the same to be delivered into the office of the Secretary The Governor shall examine the returned of State forthwith. copies of such lists and 7-days-befere-the-first-Wednesday-ef December - biennially - shall - issue - a - summons - to - such - persons - as shall-appear-to-have-been-elected-by-a-plurality-of-all-votes returned, -to-attend-and-take-their-seats--All-such-lists-shall be--laid--before--the--House--of--Representatives--on--the--first Wednesday -- of---December -- biennially -- and -- they -- shall -- finally determine - who - are - elected , if a person in a Representative District received no more than 50% of the votes duly cast for representative of that district, the Governor shall order a runoff election to be held within 2 weeks between the 2 persons who received the largest number of votes duly cast for the office of Representative of that district. The person who receives the larger number of votes in the runoff election shall be declared the district Representative. Seven days before the first Wednesday of December biennially, the Governor shall issue a summons to all persons elected by a majority of all votes returned, to attend and take their seats.

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Constitution, Art. V. Part First, §3 is amended to read:

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Section 3. Election; votes to be returned to Secretary of State; Secretary of State to lay lists before the Senate and House of Representatives; provision in case of tie. The meetings for election of Governor shall be notified, held and regulated

and votes shall be received, sorted, counted and declared and recorded, in the same manner as those for Senators Representatives. Copies of lists of votes shall be sealed and returned to the secretary's office in the same manner and at the same time as those for Senators. The Secretary of State for the time being shall, on the first Wednesday after the first Tuesday of January then next, lay the lists returned to the secretary's office before the Senate and House of Representatives to be by them examined, together with the ballots cast if they so elect, and they shall determine the number of votes duly cast for the office of Governor, - and -in -case - of -a -choice - by - plurality - of -all of-the-votes-returned-they-shall-declare-and-publish-the-same. If a person received no more than 50% of the votes duly cast for the office of Governor, the Senate and House of Representatives meeting in joint session shall order a runoff election to be held within 2 weeks between the 2 persons who received the largest number of votes duly cast for the office of Governor. The person who receives the larger number of votes in the runoff election shall be declared the Governor. If there shall be a tie between the 2 persons having-the-largest-number-of-votes-fer-Geverner in the runoff election, the House of Representatives and the Senate meeting in joint session, and each member of said bodies having a single vote, shall elect one of said 2 persons having so received an equal number of votes and the person so elected by the Senate and House of Representatives shall be declared the Governor.

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Constitutional referendum procedure; form of question; effective date. Resolved: That the municipal officers of this State shall notify the inhabitants of their respective cities, towns and plantations to meet, in the manner prescribed by law for holding a statewide election, at a statewide election, on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November following the passage of this resolution, to vote upon the ratification of the amendment proposed in this resolution by voting upon the following question:

"Do you favor amending the Constitution of Maine to require a runoff election between the 2 candidates for Governor, State Representative or State Senator who received the largest number of votes if one of those candidates did not receive more than 50% of the votes?"

The legal voters of each city, town and plantation shall vote by ballot on this question and designate their choice by a cross or check mark placed within the corresponding square below the word "Yes" or "No." The ballots must be received, sorted, counted and declared in open ward, town and plantation meetings and returns made to the Secretary of State in the same manner as

votes for members of the Legislature. The Governor shall review the returns and, if it appears that a majority of the legal votes are cast in favor of the amendment, the Governor shall proclaim that fact without delay and the amendment becomes part of the Constitution on the date of the proclamation; and be it further

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Secretary of State shall prepare ballots. Resolved: That the Secretary of State shall prepare and furnish to each city, town and plantation all ballots, returns and copies of this resolution necessary to carry out the purpose of this referendum.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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This resolution amends the Constitution of Maine to require that successful candidates for Governor, State Representative and State Senator receive more than 50% of the votes cast for their respective offices. Currently, the candidates who receive the largest number of votes in these elections are declared the winners, regardless of that number's percentage of the total number of votes cast for each office. This resolution would require a runoff election between the 2 persons who received the largest number of votes when the candidates did not receive a majority, more than 50%, of the total number of votes cast in their election. The person who received the larger number of votes in the runoff election would be declared the winner.
