	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 23 MRSA §1914, sub-§6, as repealed and replaced by 1981, c. 318, §4, is amended to read:
6 8	6. On-premise signs prohibited. An on-premise sign shall-be is prohibited if it:
.0	A. Attempts or appears to attempt to direct the movement of traffic or which interferes with, imitates or resembles any official traffic sign, signal or device;
.4	B. Prevents the driver of a vehicle from having a clear and unobstructed view of official signs and approaching or merging traffic;
.8	C. Contains, includes or is illuminated by a flashing, intermittent or moving light or lights;
0	D. Uses lighting in any way unless the light is in the opinion of the commissioner effectively shielded as to
.2	prevent beams or rays of light from being directed at any portion of the public way or is of such intensity or

()	E. In an animated sign. For the purposes of this subsection, "animated sign" means a sign that manifests

18	(3) Electrically energized signs, which are those illuminated signs whose motion or visual impression of
50	motion is activated primarily by electrical means. Electrically energized animated signs are either

flashing signs or illusionary movement signs.

A flashing sign is an illuminated sign that exhibits a preprogrammed repetitious cyclical interruption of illumination from one or more sources in which the duration of the period of illumination is either the same as or less than the duration of the period of darkness and in which the intensity of illumination varies from 0 to 100 percent during the programmed cycle.

An illusionary movement sign is an illuminated sign that exhibits the illusion of movement by means of a preprogrammed repetitious sequential switching action in which illuminated elements of the sign are turned on or off to visually simulate the impression of motion characteristic of chasing, running, blinking, oscillating, twinkling, scintillating or expanding and contracting light patterns.

This subsection does not apply to changeable signs. For the purpose of this subsection, changeable signs are those signs in which the message may be changed, electronically or mechanically, by the appearance of complete substitution or replacement of one display by another but in which the appearance of movement during message display or of messages appearing to move across the display face is not present. Changeable signs include manually activated signs and electrically activated signs. Manually activated signs are those signs whose alphabetic, pictographic or symbolic informational content can be changed or altered by manual means. Electrically activated signs are those signs whose alphabetic, pictographic or symbolic informational content can be changed or altered on a fixed display surface composed of electrically illuminated or mechanically driven changeable segments. Electrically activated signs include fixed message electronic signs in which the basic informational content has been preprogrammed to include only certain types of information projection, such as time, temperature, predictable traffic conditions or other events subject to prior programming, and computer controlled variable message electronic signs in which the information content can be changed or altered by means of computer-driven electronic impulses.

The acceptable rate of change for changeable signs is determined by multiplying by .3 the time that the average motorist, traveling at 85th-percentile speed, takes to travel from the point at which the sign's message is first legible to the point at which the motorist passes the sign. The rate of change must allow for the entire message to be seen once in that time period.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill clarifies the types of animated or moving signs that are prohibited and exempts from the prohibition those signs on which the display or message, although electronically illuminated or mechanically driven, does not appear to move. This bill also establishes an acceptable rate of change for the display of permitted signs.
