16	As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates, the following terms have the following meanings.
18	1. Acupuncture. "Acupuncture" means the insertion of
20	acupuncture needles into specific points on the skin to treat human disease and impairment and to relieve pain.

4	emergency medicines and minor surgery including episiotomies, but
	does not include the use of forceps delivery, general or spinal
6	anesthesa, caesarean section or induced abortions,

8 7. Naturopathic manipulative therapy. "Naturopathic manipulative therapy" means the manually administered, mechanical 10 treatment of body structures or tissues, in accordance with naturopathic principles, for the purpose of restoring normal 12 physiological function to the body by normalizing and balancing the musculoskeletal system of the body.

8. Naturopathic medicine. "Naturopathic medicine" means a
 system of primary health care practiced by naturopathic physicians for the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of human
 health conditions, injuries and diseases that uses education, natural medicines and therapies to support and stimulate the
 individual's intrinsic self-healing processes and naturopathic childbirth.

 9. Naturopathic physical medicine. "Naturopathic physical
 24 medicine" means the therapeutic use of physical agents of air, water, heat, cold, sound, light and electromagnetic nonionizing
 26 radiation and the physical modalities of electrotherapy, acupuncture, diathermy, ultraviolet light, ultrasound,
 28 hydrotherapy, naturopathic manipulative therapy and therapeutic exercise.

10. Naturopathic physician. "Naturopathic physician" means
 32 a person authorized and licensed to practice naturopathic medicine under this chapter.

 Surgical procedures. "Surgical procedures" means the use of operative, electrical or other methods for the surgical repair and care incidental to superficial lacerations and abrasions, superficial lesions and the removal of foreign bodies located in the superficial tissues and the use of antiseptics and local anesthetics in connection with those methods, except that it does not include general or spinal anesthetics, major surgery, surgery of the body cavities or specialized surgeries such as plastic surgery, surgery involving the eye or surgery when tendons are involved.

 12. Topical medicine. "Topical medicine" means topical analgesics, anesthetics, antiseptics, scabicides, antifungals and antibacterials.

Naturopathic Board of Examiners 20 1. Membership. The Naturopathic Board of Examiners as established in Title 5, section 12004-A, subsection 46 consists 22 of 5 members appointed by the Governor. Three of the 5 members must be naturopathic physicians who are graduates of an approved 24 naturopathic college. Beginning 3 years after the effective date of this section, the 3 naturopathic physician members must have 26 been residents in this State for 3 years immediately preceding the appointment and must have been engaged in the practice of 28 naturopathic medicine in this State, under license issued in this 30 State, for the 3 years immediately preceding the appointment. Two of the members must be representatives of the public who are 32 at least 18 years of age, have been residents of this State for 5 years immediately preceding the appointment, are not connected in any manner with or have any interest in a school of medicine, 34 health care institution or a person practicing any form of healing or treatment of bodily or mental ailments and 36 demonstrates an interest in the health problems in this State. 38 2. Terms of office. Each appointment is for a term of 6 40 years for board members who are naturopathic physicians and 2 years for public members, except that of the initial board 42 appointees, one naturopathic physician member must be appointed for a term of 6 years, one naturopathic physician member must be 44 appointed for a term of 4 years, one naturopathic physician member must be appointed for a term of 2 years, one public member 46 must be appointed for a term of 3 years and one public member must be appointed for a term of 2 years. A member may be removed from office by the Governor if the Governor finds that the member 48 was quilty of malfeasance, misfeasance or dishonorable conduct.

26	skillfully and safely practice naturopathic medicine unless that license has been restored to good standing by that

34	practice naturopathic medicine by reciprocity, the applicant must:

Enforcement and penalties 28 1. Unlicensed person. A person not licensed pursuant to this chapter who professes to be a naturopathic physician or 30 suggests in any way that the person practices naturopathic medicine is quilty of a misdemeanor for each offense. A person 32 who violates this subsection may be enjoined by the Superior Court on petition by the board. 34 2. Noncompliance. A person licensed pursuant to this 36 chapter who engages in the practice of naturopathic medicine without complying with this chapter is subject to disciplinary 38 measures and may be subject to refused renewal, limitation, revocation or suspension of the license to practice naturopathic 40 medicine. 42 §14712. Administrative services 44 The Department of Human Services shall provide administrative services to the board. The board is responsible 46 for all administrative services and must be reimbursed by fees collected by the board. 48 Sec. 3. Effective date. This Act takes effect January 1, 1996. 50
