Sec. 1. 8 MRSA $\S 222$, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 23, $\S 2$, is amended to read:

\$222. Possession of fireworks

- No person may possess or have under his that person's control fireworks, except if that person is issued a permit pursuant to section 227.
- Sec. 2. 8 MRSA §229, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1985, c. 23, §2, is amended to read:
- 1. Criminal penalties. Any person who violates section 222, where if the value of the fireworks possessed exceeds \$100, or section 224 or 225 is guilty of a Class E crime. Any person who violates section 227 by failing to obtain a permit for display commits a Class D crime. Any person who violates section 20 227 by conducting the display in violation of the rules commits of a Class E crime.

STATEMENT OF FACT

This bill clarifies that only properly permitted persons may possess fireworks. A person who possesses fireworks that exceed \$100 in value without obtaining a permit is guilty of a Class D crime. A person who obtains the permit but fails to display the fireworks according to the rules adopted by the Commissioner of Public Safety is guilty of a Class E crime.
