An Act Concerning Special Licenses in the Department of Marine Resources.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 12 MRSA $\S6074$, first \P , as amended by PL 1989, c. 204, $\S1$, is further amended to read:

The commissioner may, with the advice and consent of the council, issue a special license for aquaculture or education, - which that exempts the holder from one or more marine resources' laws as to the time, place, length, condition, amount and manner of taking or possessing any a marine organism. Special licenses issued by the commissioner employees of the department when they are acting in their capacity as employees under the direction of the commissioner or the commissioner's designated representative do not require the advice and consent of the advisory council. Special licenses issued for purposes of aquaria, municipal shellfish programs, festivals or public service activities do not require the advice and consent of the advisory council.

Sec. 2. 12 MRSA §6623, sub-§2, as repealed and replaced by PL 1985, c. 255, is amended to read:

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2. Special license for dredging. The commissioner may issue a special license, acting in accordance with the procedures set forth in section 6074, subsections 1 to 6, to operate a hydraulic or mechanical soft-shell clam dredge for educational or scientific purposes, or for use on an aquaculture lease site of for-municipal-transplanting-projects. The dredge shall may not be used for commercial soft-shell clam harvesting except as authorized in this subsection. The dredge design and proposed operation shall must be approved by the commissioner. The operation of the dredge shall may not interfere with commercial digging and shall may not be used for taking marine worms, lobsters or other crustaceans.

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STATEMENT OF FACT

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The Department of Marine Resources receives requests to hold lobsters in school aquaria, to haul lobster gear during the Sunday closure at summer festivals or, by way of example, to possess clams in a closed area as a part of a public service project. Current law requires that projects of this nature when a marine resources law or regulation would be violated need the advise and consent of the department advisory council. This bill provides that these kinds of project do not require review by the advisory council but do require review and specific authorization by the commissioner.
