The ultimate goal and intent of the Legislature is to ensure that the State's schools will enable today's students to gain the knowledge and skills necessary to be effective parents, citizens, workers and adults.

§6209. System of learning results established

The department in consultation with the state board shall 10 establish and implement a comprehensive, statewide system of learning results, referred to in this section as the "system," no later than the 2002-03 school year. The system, based broadly 12 upon quiding principles set forth in this section, must establish 14 high academic standards at all grade levels in the areas of math; English; science and technology; social studies, including history, economics and civics; career preparation; visual and 16 performing arts; health and physical education; and foreign 18 languages. Only students in a public school or a private school approved by the State pursuant to section 2902 and approved for 20 the receipt of public funds by private secondary schools pursuant to section 2951 are required to participate in the system of 22 learning results. The commissioner shall develop accommodation provisions for instances where course content conflicts with 24 sincerely held religious beliefs and practices of a student's parent or guardian. The system shall be adopted to accommodate 26 exceptional students as defined in section 7001, subsection 2. 28 1. Guiding principles. Each student must leave school as: 30 A. A clear and effective communicator who: (1) Uses oral, written, visual, artistic and 32 technological modes of expression;

- (2) Reads, listens to and interprets messages from multiple sources; and
 - (3) Uses English and at least one other language;
 - B. A self-directed and life-long learner who:
- (1) Creates career and education plans that reflect personal goals, interests and skills, and available resources;
 - (2) Demonstrates the capacity to undertake independent study; and
 - (3) Finds and uses information from libraries, electronic data bases and other resources;

2. Content standards. Each student shall study and achieve proficiency in the following content standard subject areas:

- 8 A. Career preparation;
- 10 <u>B. English language arts;</u>

12 <u>C. Foreign languages;</u>

- 14 D. Health and physical education;
- 16 E. Mathematics;
- 18 F. Science and technology;
- 20 <u>G. Social studies; and</u>
- 22 <u>H. Visual and performing arts.</u>
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Sec. 2. Development of standards and indicators. The Department 26 of Education and the State Board of Education, and the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters shall jointly develop recommended content 28 standards and student performance indicators for the subject 30 areas described in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 6209, subsection 2. Following development of those 32 recommendations the content standards and performance indicators must be established subject to rules established jointly by the 34 department and the board in accordance with the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 375, subchapter II. 36 Proposed rules must be widely circulated to school administrative units and the public during the rule-making process. Rules adopted pursuant to this Act are major substantive rules as 38 defined in Title 5, chapter 375, subchapter II-A, and must be 40 reviewed by the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters and cultural affairs and approved by the Legislature. The rules may not require a 42 school administrative unit to incur additional expenditures unless the State pays for 90% of the costs. 44

46 Sec. 3. Schools to adopt system of learning results subject to availability of funds. Following approval of rules establishing 48 content standards and student performance indicators and subject to state funding for professional development assistance, school 50 administrative units shall adopt the system of

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A school administrative unit may delay learning results. adoption of the system of learning results in the subject areas 2 career preparation, foreign languages of and visual and 4 performing arts if adoption in those subject areas can not be achieved within existing local resources. The Department of 6 Education shall develop a reporting mechanism that permits a school administrative unit to report such a delay to the department at no cost to the unit. 8

Sec. 4. Department to review methods and potential costs of 10 implementing learning results. By January 1, 1997, the Department 12 of Education shall review and make recommendations to the joint standing committee of the Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters on methods for implementing learning results in 14 the areas of career preparation, foreign languages and visual and 16 performing arts within existing local resources. If the department finds that additional funds may be required to implement learning results in those subject areas, the department 18 shall review and estimate the potential costs of implementation. The department shall also review and make recommendations on 20 establishing a date by which all school administrative units must implement learning results in all subject areas. 22

Sec. 5. System must include plan to assist school administrative 24 units. The system of learning results established in the Maine 26 Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 6209 must include a plan to assist school administrative units in helping all students achieve the learning results. The Department of Education, in 28 consultation with the State Board of Education and school 30 administrative units, shall develop the plan for assistance. The plan must also include criteria to identify school administrative 32 units experiencing difficulty meeting the learning results and provision the of intensive assistance to these school 34 administrative units. The plan for assistance must be established by July 30, 1997 and implemented during the 1997-98 36 school year.

Sec. 6. System must include plan for professional development. 38 The system of learning results established in the Maine Revised 40 Statutes, Title 20-A, section 6209 must include a statewide plan for professional development designed to promote the learning results. The professional development plan must be established 42 by the Department of Education in consultation with the State 44 Board of Education, local school administrative units, higher education institutions in this State, regional partnerships and 46 other interested stakeholders. The professional development plan must be completed by June 30, 1996. The plan must be implemented 48 on July 1, 1996 and must include incentive funds awarded by the Department Education of to all school administrative

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units participating in the plan. Incentive funds must be awarded at a rate of \$8 per pupil or \$10 per pupil for school administrative units whose professional development plans are accomplished in collaboration with one or more other school administrative units. School administrative units must submit to the Commissioner of Education a proposal outlining the unit's plan for professional development. Receipt of incentive funds is contingent upon approval of the proposal by the commissioner.

10 Sec. 7. State commitment to professional development. Continuation of the system of learning results established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 6209 is contingent on 12 an annual General Fund appropriation for professional development 14 of not less than \$2,000,000. The annual appropriation must be in addition to customary and ongoing appropriations of General Fund 16 dollars for education purposes, including grades kindergarten to 12 and higher education. Failure of the Legislature to annually appropriate a minimum of \$2,000,000 for professional development 18 will result in suspension of the system of learning results.

Sec. 8. Establish student assessments. Student achievement of the learning results established in the Maine Revised Statutes, 22 Title 20-A, section 6209 must be measured by a combination of 24 state and local assessments to measure progress and ensure accountability. The 4th-grade, 8th-grade and 11th-grade results 26 of the Maine Education Assessment, the "MEA," are the state assessments used to measure achievement of the learning results. 28 The 4th-grade and 8th-grade MEA must be used to measure achievement of the learning results beginning in the 1998-99 The llth-grade MEA must be used to measure 30 school year. achievement of the learning results beginning in the 1999-2000 Local school administrative units may develop 32 school year. additional assessments to measure achievement of the learning 34 results, including student portfolios, performances, demonstrations and other records of achievements.

Sec. 9. Recommendation on student achievement. By January 1, 1997, the State Board of Education and the Department of Education shall review and make recommendations to the Legislature on linking achievement of the learning results established in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 42 6209 to completion of high school.

Sec. 10. Report. 44 The State Board of Education and the Department of Education shall provide an annual report no later than December 15th to the joint standing committee of the 46 Legislature having jurisdiction over education matters regarding 48 progress toward implementation of the learning results. The annual report may include recommendations for legislation concerning implementation of the learning results. 50

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The Department of Education, in consultation with the State 2 Board of Education, is required to develop a system of learning results. If the rules that are adopted to implement this system 4 result in additional expenses to school administrative units, the 5 State will be required to fund at least 90% of those additional 6 costs. The additional appropriations that may be required can 5 not be determined until those rules are adopted.

This bill includes a General Fund appropriation of \$2,100,000 in fiscal year 1996-97 for the Department of Education to provide professional development incentive awards and for grants to regional demonstration sites for efficiency and consolidation programs. Future annual appropriations of at least \$2,000,000 will be required to fund the continuing professional development costs.

The costs associated with planning, rule-making and reporting requirements can be absorbed by the Department of Education and the State Board of Education utilizing existing budgeted resources.'

STATEMENT OF FACT

The amendment replaces the bill. The amendment establishes 26 6 guiding principles to aid in the development of learning standards for all public school students. Recommendations for 28 the standards, referred to as "learning results" and consisting content standards and performance indicators, will be of 30 developed jointly by the Joint Standing Committee on Education and Cultural Affairs, the Department of Education and the State Board of Education in the areas of career preparation, English 32 language arts, foreign languages, health and physical education, mathematics, science and technology, social studies and visual 34 and performing arts.

Following development of the recommendations, the department and the board will jointly establish content standards and performance indicators through the rule-making process. As required by that process, public hearings will be held on the proposed standards and indicators prior to consideration by the Legislature. Review and final acceptance or rejection by the Legislature will occur during the First Regular Session of the 118th Legislature.

46 The amendment requires school administrative units to adopt the learning results within current resource levels. Adoption in 48 the areas of English language arts, health and physical education, mathematics, science and technology and social studies 50 can be achieved within existing budgeted resources.

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School administrative units may delay implementation of the learning standards in the areas of career preparation, foreign languages and visual and performing arts if implementation cannot be achieved within existing resources.

6 The amendment provides a \$2,000,000 appropriation for professional development for the 1996-97 school year and requires 8 future annual appropriations of at least \$2,000,000 for professional development. Failure of the Legislature to 10 appropriate funds for professional development in any year will result in suspension of the system of learning results.

The amendment requires the department to use the Maine Education Assessment, the "MEA," to measure student and school 14 performance in achieving the learning standards. Students do not 16 have to pass the MEA or achieve a minimum score to complete any grade or graduate from high school. The amendment requires the 18 state board and the department to review and make recommendations to the Legislature by January 1, 1997 on linking achievement of 20 the learning results to completion of high school. The amendment also encourages school administrative units to develop additional 22 local assessments to measure student achievement, including student portfolios, performances, demonstrations and other records of achievements. 24

The amendment requires the department, in consultation with the state board, to develop a plan to assist school administrative units in helping all students achieve the learning results. The amendment also requires the department to develop a plan for providing intensive assistance to school administrative units experiencing difficulty meeting the learning results.

The amendment makes clear that only public school students 34 and students attending private schools approved for educating public school students are required to adopt the learning 36 results. Home-schooled students and students attending religious schools are exempt from the provisions of the bill. The 38 requires the amendment also commissioner to develop accommodations for students requiring special education services 40 and for students when course content conflicts with religious beliefs. 42

The amendment adds a fiscal note and an appropriation 44 section to the bill.

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
