An Act to Allow a Change in the Speed Limit on Certain Highways.

(AFTER DEADLINE)

Approved for introduction by a majority of the Legislative Council pursuant to Joint Rule 27. Reference to the Committee on Transportation suggested and ordered printed.

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 23 MRSA §1973, sub-§2, as amended by PL 1987, c. 257, §1, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

6 2. Speed limit. The authority may by rule impose a maximum limitation on the speed of vehicles using the turnpike if the authority determines, upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation, that the speed limit set by Title 29-A,
10 section 2074 is greater than is reasonable or safe under the condition found to exist at an intersection, curve, dangerous
12 location or any other part of the turnpike under its jurisdiction. The authority may regulate the volume and weight
14 of vehicles admitted to the turnpike.

Sec. 2. 29-A MRSA 2052, sub- as enacted by PL 1993, c. 683, Pt. A, and affected by Pt. B, 5, is amended to read:

6. Ways with speed limit of at least 65 miles per hour. An
operator driving on a limited-access way with a speed limit of <u>at</u>
<u>least</u> 65 miles per hour is restricted in ordinary operation to
the right-hand lane and may use adjacent lanes for overtaking and
passing another vehicle, but must return to the right-hand lane
at the earliest opportunity. This requirement does not apply to
an authorized emergency vehicle, or to a vehicle otherwise
directed by posted signs, a law enforcement officer or a highway
maintenance crew.

Sec. 3. 29-A MRSA §2073, sub-§1, as enacted by PL 1993, c. 30 683, Pt. A, §2 and affected by Pt. B, §5, is repealed.

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Sec. 4. 29-A MRSA §2073, sub-§1-A is enacted to read:

34 1-A. Authority to regulate. Except as provided in section 2075, subsection 2 and notwithstanding section 2074, subsection 1, the Commissioner of Transportation, with the approval of the 36 Chief of the State Police, may by rule impose a maximum limitation on the speed of vehicles using the Interstate Highway 38 System if the commissioner determines, upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation, that the speed limit set 40 by section 2074 is greater than is reasonable or safe under the condition found to exist at an intersection, curve, dangerous 42 location or any other part of the Interstate Highway System under the commissioner's jurisdiction. The commissioner, with the 44 approval of the Chief of the State Police, may restrict the 46 maximum rate of speed on any other public way where a speed limit will minimize the danger of accident, promote the free flow of traffic or in response to changes in federal laws. The 48 commissioner may not set maximum speed limits for the Maine 50 Turnpike.

Sec. 5. 29-A MRSA §2074, as amended by PL 1995, c. 65, Pt. A, §106 and affected by §153 and Pt. C, §15, is repealed and the following enacted in its place:

6 §2074. Reasonable and proper rates of speed

A person operating a vehicle of any character on a public 8 highway of this State shall drive the vehicle in a careful and prudent manner and at a rate of speed no greater than is 10 reasonable and proper under the conditions existing at the point of operation, taking into account the amount and character of 12 traffic, condition of brakes, weight of vehicle, grade and width of highway, condition of road surface and freedom of obstruction 14 to the view ahead. The person operating the vehicle shall drive the vehicle so as not to unduly or unreasonably endanger the 16 life, limb, property or other rights of a person entitled to the use of the street or highway. When no special hazard exists that 18 requires lower speed, the speed of a vehicle on the Maine Turnpike or the Interstate Highway System not in excess of the 20 limits established in subsection 1; section 2073, subsection 1-A; or section 2075, subsection 2 is lawful. 22 24 1. Situations requiring maximum speed limit. Except when conditions require a lower speed, for the following situations, the maximum rates of speed are as follows: 26 28 A. Fifteen miles per hour when passing a school during recess or while children are going to or leaving school during opening or closing hours; 30 32 B. Fifteen miles per hour when approaching within 50 feet and in traversing an intersection when the operator's view 34 is obstructed except when preference is given to through movement of traffic in one direction by "stop" signs or other traffic control devices or by direction of a law 36 enforcement officer. An operator's view is considered obstructed when at any time during the last 50 feet of an 38 approach to an intersection there is not a clear and 40 uninterrupted view of the intersection and of the traffic on all ways entering the intersection for a distance of 200 feet from it; 42 C. Twenty-five miles per hour in a business or residential 44 district or built-up portion unless otherwise posted; 46 D. Forty-five miles per hour on all other public ways, 48 unless otherwise posted and except for the Maine Turnpike and the Interstate Highway System; 50

	E. On ways with a speed limit higher than 45 miles per
2	hour, 45 miles per hour for a school bus transporting pupils to and from school. At all other times, a school bus may
4	not exceed 55 miles per hour;
6	F. On ways with a higher maximum speed limit when lights are required, 35 miles per hour for a motor-driven cycle,
8	unless it is equipped with a headlight adequate to reveal a
10	person 300 feet ahead of it; and
12	<u>G. Sixty-five miles per hour on the Maine Turnpike or the Interstate Highway System when lights are required, unless otherwise posted.</u>
14	2 Connect areas The connect on built up portion of a
16	2. Compact areas. The compact or built-up portion of a municipality is the territory contiguous to a way that is built up with structures situated less than 150 feet apart for a
18	<u>distance of at least 1/4 of a mile. Municipal officers may</u> <u>designate a compact or built-up portion by appropriate signs.</u>
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22	3. Criminal offense. A person commits a Class E crime if that person operates a motor vehicle at a speed that exceeds the maximum rate of speed by 30 miles per hour or more.
24	The complaint for a violation of a speed limit must specify the
26	speed at which the defendant is alleged to have operated a motor vehicle.
28	A person who operates a motor vehicle on the Maine Turnpike or
30	the Interstate Highway System at a speed in excess of a reasonable and prudent speed commits a traffic infraction
32	punishable by a fine of not less than \$50.
34	4. Exception. This section does not apply to the operation of a vehicle:
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38	A. In racing events and exhibitions at which the public does not have access to the operating area; or
40	B. On private land to which the public does not have access when used by or with authorization of the landowner.
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44	STATEMENT OF FACT
46	This bill changes the authority of the Commissioner of Transportation and the Turnpike Authority to impose a maximum
48	speed limit of 65 miles per hour for the Maine Turnpike and the Interstate Highway System. The bill requires a person to operate
50	a vehicle at a reasonable and prudent speed, except in certain

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specified situations. The Commissioner of Transportation, with
the approval of the Chief of the State Police, or the Turnpike Authority, based upon an engineering and traffic investigation,
is permitted to impose a lower speed limit in those areas determined dangerous.

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
