COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "4" to S.P. 148, L.D. 427

Further amend the bill by inserting at the end before the summary the following:

## FISCAL NOTE

This bill may increase prosecutions for Class D crimes. If a jail sentence is imposed, the additional costs to the counties are estimated to be \$83.78 per day per prisoner. These costs are not reimbursed by the State. The number of prosecutions that may result in a jail sentence and the resulting costs to the county jail system are expected to be insignificant.

The additional workload, administrative costs and indigent defense costs associated with the minimal number of new cases filed in the court system can be absorbed within the budgeted resources of the Judicial Department. The collection of additional fines may also increase General Fund revenue by minor amounts.'

## **SUMMARY**

This amendment is the minority report of the Joint Standing Committee on Criminal Justice. It specifies that a person must have parental rights and duties with respect to a child in order to be guilty of selling that child. It also specifies that to be guilty of selling a child a sale must be made for the purpose of receiving money or anything of value and exempts any transaction made pursuant to a legally authorized adoption. This amendment also makes technical corrections to accommodate varying effective dates already in the law.

The amendment also adds a fiscal note to the bill.
