§4330. Compliance

Beginning January 1, 1999, a person seeking to engage in the business of body piercing shall comply with the provisions of this chapter.

§4331. Restriction

This chapter does not restrict the activities of a physician or surgeon licensed under chapter 48.

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Sec. 2. Task Force. The Commissioner of Human Services shall act as the chair of a task force to be formed for the purpose of recommending legislation to the Legislature concerning licensing, training, sanitation and other subjects determined necessary to protect the health and welfare of persons seeking the services of practitioners of body piercing. The task force consists of 8 persons to be appointed by the commissioner and must include a representative of the Board of Barbering and Cosmetology, a surgeon licensed in this State, a representative of a nonprofit association of professional body piercers, a representative of a nonprofit professional cosmetology association representative from an organization representing the interests of health agencies. The commissioner may appoint remaining 3 members from any other groups that may, in the judgment of the commissioner, be of assistance. The task force shall present its recommendations to the Legislature by January 1, 1999.

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34 SUMMARY

The bill directs the Department of Human Services to establish sterilization, sanitation and safety standards for persons engaged in the business of body piercing. The bill requires practitioners of body piercing to be registered with the municipality in which they practice. The bill requires local health officers to annually inspect locations where body piercing is practiced.

The bill also establishes a task force to recommend legislation to regulate body piercing.
