#### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

Sec. 1. 35-A MRSA §307-A is enacted to read:

### §307-A. Exemption for certain telephone utilities

The commission may determine that all or specified portions 8 of the provisions of section 307 will not apply and the commission will not exercise its powers of suspension and 10 investigation under section 310 for a telephone utility, a specified group of telephone utilities or specified services 12 offered by one or a group of telephone utilities. The commission may make this determination only if it finds that the utility or 14 group of utilities does not exercise significant power over pricing in the markets for the specified services and that the commission's determination will not result in unjust or 16 unreasonable rates for any customers in the markets for those services. The commission may limit its determination to 18 specified geographic areas. A utility whose rates or terms and 20 conditions are subject to the exemptions permitted by this section remains subject to other applicable provisions of this

24 SUMMARY

Title and commission rules.

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This bill allows, but does not require, the Public Utilities
Commission to suspend rate regulation of telephone utilities that
have insignificant market control if that action would not result
in unjust or unreasonable rates for customers. Any such
telephone utility would still be required to file its rates with
the Public Utilities Commission, but those rates would not be
subject to prior commission approval.
