## **SUMMARY**

This amendment requires the Bureau of Health, the Bureau of Insurance and the Bureau of Labor Standards to conduct the occupational disease study with the Workers' Compensation Board. It adds to the list of issues that must be included in the study report a recommended definition of occupational disease and a recommendation for tracking occupational disease data. It also changes the reporting deadline from January 1, 1999 to January 15, 1999.
