2 Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §1825-B, sub-§7, as amended by PL 1991, c. 780, Pt. Y, §70, is further amended to read: 4 Awards to lowest bidder. Except as otherwise provided 6 7. by law, orders awarded or contracts made by the Director of the Bureau of General Services or by any department or agency of the 8 State must be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder, taking 10 into consideration the qualities of the goods or services to be supplied, their conformity with the specifications, the purposes 12 for which they are required, the date of delivery, the information received pursuant to section 1825-D and the ultimate cost to the State. If the bidder that was initially awarded the 14order or contract does not perform, the Director of the Bureau of

Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

16 General Services may cancel the contract and award a new contract to the 2nd lewest responsible <u>another</u> bidder. The order or 18 contract may not be awarded to a bidder that the Director of the Bureau of General Services determined was not in compliance at 20 the time the initial bid was submitted.

Sec. 2. 5 MRSA §1825-D, sub-§1-A is enacted to read:

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- 24 <u>1-A. Request for information.</u> For requesting information from bidders that includes, but is not limited to: 26
- A. The amount of taxes paid by the bidder to the State28during the preceding and current tax years, including income
taxes, property taxes, personal property taxes, employment30taxes and gas taxes;
- 32 <u>B. The amount of potential sales tax arising from the</u> contract that would be paid by the bidder to the State;
- C. Any effect on the employment or payroll of residents of this State;
- 38 D. The degree to which the bidder meets or exceeds various state and federal regulatory requirements;
 - E. The cost of monitoring the contract; and
 - F. Any other state fiscal impact.
 - SUMMARY
- 48 This bill requires bidders for state contracts to furnish financial information that allows the State to assess the fiscal 50 impact of the contracts on the State.
