Sec. 2. 32 MRSA §12501, sub-§§6-A and 6-B are enacted to read:

6-A. Massage therapist or massage practitioner. "Massage therapist" or "massage practitioner" means a person who provides or offers to provide massage therapy for a fee, monetary or otherwise. This definition includes the use of different forms of the term "massage therapist" or "massage practitioner," such as "masseuse" or "masseur."

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6-B. Massage therapy. "Massage therapy" means a scientific or skillful manipulation of soft tissue for therapeutic or remedial purposes, specifically for improving muscle tone and circulation and promoting health and physical well-being. The term includes, but is not limited to, manual and mechanical procedures for the purpose of treating soft tissue only, the use of supplementary aids such as rubbing alcohol, liniments, oils, antiseptics, powders, herbal preparations, creams or lotions, procedures such as oil rubs, salt glows and hot or cold packs or other similar procedures or preparations commonly used in this practice. This term specifically excludes manipulation of the spine or articulations and excludes sexual contact as defined in Title 17-A, section 251, subsection 1, paragraph D.

Membership. The Board of Complementary Health Care Providers, as established in Title 5, section 12004-A, subsection 8-A, shall regulate the professions of acupuncture, massage therapy and naturopathic medicine according to the provisions of this chapter. The board consists of 7 9 members appointed by the The Governor shall make the initial appointments to the board no later than 60 days after the effective date of this section and shall inform the Commissioner of Professional and Financial Regulation of these appointments. The commissioner shall call the first meeting of the board on a date no later than 30 days following notification of appointments by the Governor. All members of the board must be residents of this State. members of the board must be practitioners of massage therapy who are eligible for licensure under, or are licensed pursuant to, the requirements of subchapter IV. Two members of the board must be acupuncturists licensed in this State. Two members of the board must be practitioners of naturopathic medicine who are eligible for licensure under, or are licensed pursuant to, the

## §12533. Requirements for licensure

An applicant must be 18 years of age or older and satisfactorily pass any examination the board may prescribe to be eligible for a license to practice massage therapy at any level. Each applicant shall demonstrate competence to engage in the practice of massage therapy in a manner that safeguards the interests of the public.

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1. Requirements. The following requirements are considered minimum evidence satisfactory to the board that an applicant is qualified for licensure under this subchapter:

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A. Pass the National Certification Examination for Therapeutic Massage and Bodywork administered by the Psychological Corporation or its successor organization or have a diploma from a school of massage therapy that is accredited by the Commission on Massage Training Accreditation/Approval or its successor organization;

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B. Be 18 years of age or older;

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C. Possess a high school diploma or its equivalent; and

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D. Furnish to the department a signed photograph of the applicant. The photograph must be a minimum of 5 inches by 3 inches.

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2. Existing certified massage therapists. Upon renewal of licensure pursuant to section 12535, a person who remits appropriate fees within one year after the effective date of this section may be licensed by the board.

3. Existing registered massage practitioners. A massage practitioner may use the title of "registered massage practitioner" to practice massage therapy pursuant to the biennial renewal process under section 12535 until December 31, 6 1999. 8 A. The applicant has until December 31, 1999 to show satisfactory evidence of having used or been identified by the title "massage practitioner" and has a combination of 10 massage therapy education and appropriate diversified experience totaling 5 years or 500 hours. If a massage 12 practitioner has 500 hours or less of massage therapy education, then one year of massage therapy experience 14 acceptable to the board may be substituted for each 100 hours of massage therapy education required. A person is 16 considered to have used or been identified by the title 18 "massage practitioner" if the person demonstrates to the satisfaction of the board that the person was either self-employed as a massage practitioner or, in the course of 20 regular employment, rendered or offered to render to another 22 person massage therapy services. B. Beginning on the effective date of this section, new 24 applications for "registered massage practitioner" may not 26 be accepted or approved by the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation or the board. 28 4. License not allowed. An individual whose license to practice massage therapy or any other related field has been 30 revoked or suspended in this State or any other state may not be 32 licensed under this section, unless the period of revocation or suspension has been completed and the board has conducted a 34 competency review and determined that an acceptable degree of rehabilitation has been accomplished. 36 §12534.
