An Act to Amend the Composition of the Information Services Policy Board and Establish a Clearinghouse on State Information and Information Technology.

### Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:

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Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §1892, sub-§§2 to 4, as amended by PL 1989, c. 857, §36, are further amended to read:

- Advisory members. Advisory members must be appointed by Legislative Council to represent the the agencies Legislature that provide research and information Legislature and its committees and an advisory member must be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court to assure ensure that the needs of the Legislature and the Judiciary are known and to inform them of available information, access and innovations to be considered. In addition, the Chancellor of the University of Maine System and the President of the Maine Technical College System each shall appoint an advisory member to ensure that the needs of state institutions of higher education are known and to encourage the development of compatible information systems and the sharing of information and technologies between educational institutions and agencies of State Government.
- 3. Terms of office. The voting and advisory members representing state agencies of the Legislature, the Judiciary, the University of Maine System, the Maine Technical College System and the office of the Governor shall serve for a period that coincides with the term of appointment to the agency they represent or to the term designated by the appointing authority, unless revoked sooner by the appointing authority. The members of the private sector serve 3-year terms, except that the initial term of one member is 2 years and the initial term of the other members is 3 years.

4. Expenses and compensation. All members are entitled to reimbursement for expenses in accordance with chapter 379. Members representing state agencies, the Executive Office, the Legislature, the University of Maine System, the Maine Technical College System and the Judiciary are reimbursed for expenses from the budgets of the departments they represent.

- A. The members of the board are not entitled to compensation.
- Sec. 2. 5 MRSA §13123, sub-§11-A is enacted to read:

11-A. Clearinghouse on state information and information technology for intergovernmental use. Establish a clearinghouse on information technology and state information for use by local governments, schools, libraries and institutions of higher education in the State no later than January 1, 1998. The clearinghouse must:

- A. Make available to local governments, schools, libraries
  and institutions of higher education current information
  regarding computer technologies and standards for accessing
  state information data bases;
  - B. Develop, in consultation with the Information Services Policy Board, information technology standards and methods of electronic transmission of information applicable to state executive agency data bases that will allow increased access by local governments, schools, libraries and institutions of higher education to public information residing in the data bases; and
  - C. Catalogue, maintain and make available to local governments, schools, libraries and institutions of higher education listings of all major data bases of state executive agencies that are public information and reside on state computer systems.
    - Agencies of State Government shall cooperate with the foundation in providing information necessary to establish and maintain the clearinghouse.

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#### **SUMMARY**

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Science This bill directs the Maine and Foundation to establish a clearinghouse for information regarding state information and information technology that will assist local governments, schools, libraries and institutions of higher education in accessing public information residing computerized data bases of state agencies. The clearinghouse must develop standards for state agency data bases that will allow increased access to public information and must publish listings of available information. The bill also amends the composition of the Information Services Policy Board by adding representatives of the University of Maine System and the Maine Technical College System as advisory members. Addition of these members is to ensure that the computer information needs of state institutions of higher education are known and to encourage the sharing of computerized information and information technologies between educational institutions and agencies of State Government.
