An Act to Give Fire Marshals the Same Retirement Provisions as Other State Law Enforcement Officers.

	Be it enacted by the People of the State of Maine as follows:
2	Sec. 1. 5 MRSA §17851, sub-§13 is enacted to read:
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	<b>13. State fire marshal, investigator and inspector.</b> A
6	<u>state fire marshal, a state fire marshal investigator or a state</u>
	<u>fire marshal inspector qualifies for a service retirement benefit</u>
8	<u>if the state fire marshal, state fire marshal investigator or</u>
	<u>state fire marshal inspector completed 25 years of creditable</u>
10	<u>service as a state fire marshal, a state fire marshal</u>
	<u>investigator or a state fire marshal inspector.</u>
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	Sec. 2. 5 MRSA §17852, sub-§13 is enacted to read:
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	13. State fire marshal, investigator and inspector. The
16	<u>amount of a service retirement benefit for a state fire marshal,</u>
	<u>a state fire marshal investigator or a state fire marshal</u>
18	inspector under section 17851, subsection 13 must be computed as
	follows.

	A. For a person who retires after reaching the age of 55,
22	the retirement benefit must be computed in accordance with
	subsection 1.
24	
	B. For a person who retires before reaching the age of 55,
26	the retirement benefit is determined in accordance with
	subsection 1, except that:
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	(1) The amount arrived at under subsection 1 is
30	reduced by applying to that amount the percentage that
	<u>a life annuity due at age 55 bears to the life annuity</u>
32	due at the age of retirement; and
34	(2) For the purpose of making the computation under
	<u>subparagraph (1), the board-approved tables of</u>
36	annuities in effect at the date of the member's
	<u>retirement is used.</u>
38	
	This paragraph applies to a member who, on July 1, 1993, has
40	<u>10 years of creditable service. For the purpose of</u>
	calculating creditable service under this subsection only,
42	<u>creditable service includes time during which a member</u>
	<u>participated in the voluntary cost savings plan or the</u>
44	voluntary employee incentive program, authorized by Public
	Law 1989, chapter 702, Part F, section 6 and Public Law
46	<u>1991, chapter 591, Part BB and chapter 780, Part VV, or 10</u>
	years of combined creditable service under this Part and
48	Title 3, chapter 29, or creditable service available to a
	member that the member was eligible to purchase on June 30,
50	<u>1993 and that the member does purchase in accordance with</u>
	rules adopted by the board.

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2	<u>C.</u> For a person who retires before reaching the age of 55,
	the retirement benefit is determined in accordance with
4	subsection 1, except that the benefit is reduced by 6% for
	each year that the member's age precedes 55.
6	
	This paragraph applies to a member who, on July 1, 1993,
8	does not have 10 years of creditable service.
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	SUMMARY
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	This bill permits state fire marshals, state fire marshal
14	investigators and state fire marshal inspectors with 25 years
	creditable service to retire at the age of 55 without a reduction
16	in benefits.
