inspection fee and repair costs may pose an unreasonable economic 2 burden. Each of the proposals must specify a time frame for 4 implementation that provides adequate time for public education 6 and a pilot program. In addition to the proposals for a motor vehicle inspection and maintenance program, the report must include a recommendation as to whether an alternative strategy or program can be used, 10 alone or in conjunction with a motor vehicle inspection and program, to achieve compliance with 12 maintenance requirements through the United States Environmental Protection Agency's Project XL program, defined at 60 Federal Register, 14 studying the Project XL 27,282(1995). In program, 16 commissioner shall consider, but is not limited to, strategies to reduce vehicle miles traveled in passenger cars and trucks. 18 In developing the proposals, the commissioner shall solicit input from the public. The Commissioner of Public Safety and the 20 Secretary of State shall work with the commissioner in developing the proposals. 22 24 In the report, the commissioner shall rank the proposals and provide a justification for the rankings, including a description 26 of environmental benefits and estimated costs to vehicle owners and station owners; and be it further 28 Sec. 3. Interim updates. Resolved: That the commissioner shall meet with the Joint Standing Committee on Natural Resources or a 30 subcommittee appointed by the chairs at least twice between July 32 1, 1997 and December 1, 1997 to update and consult with the committee on the progress of the study; and be it further 34 Sec. 4. Legislation. Resolved: That the Joint Committee on Natural Resources is authorized to report out 36 legislation relating to a motor vehicle inspection maintenance program or a Project XL program during the Second 38 Regular Session of the 118th Legislature.

Emergency clause. In view of the emergency cited in the preamble, this resolve takes effect when approved.

This resolve is an emergency and directs the Commissioner of Environmental Protection to study options for complying with the requirements of the federal Clean Air Act relating to a motor vehicle inspection and maintenance program in the State. The resolve requires that the commissioner submit a report to the
Legislature by January 5, 1998 that includes at least 2 proposals
for a motor vehicle inspection and maintenance program. In
addition, the report must include a recommendation as to whether
the United States Environmental Protection Agency's Project XL
program can be used as an alternative strategy to meet the
federal Clean Air Act requirements. The resolve requires the
commissioner to solicit input from the public in developing the
proposals.

The resolve requires the commissioner to meet with the Joint Standing Committee on Natural Resources at least twice during the study. Finally, the resolve authorizes the committee to report out legislation during the Second Regular Session of the 118th Legislature.
