1. Intervention. The method, frequency and intensity of intervention provided by the State to an individual diagnosed with autism or an autism-related disorder must be:

A. Prescribed by professionals academically and clinically qualified in the diagnosis and treatment of autism as determined by a task force; and

B. Based upon scientific, peer-reviewed clinical studies conducted using accepted methodology.

2. Individual providing intervention. An individual who meets the required credentials as determined by a task force is the only person allowed to administer prescribed intervention for autism or an autism-related disorder. The individual must be supervised by professionals academically and clinically qualified in the treatment of autism as determined by a task force.

Sec. 2. Task force. The Commissioner of Education, with assistance from the Commissioner of Human Services, establish a task force to research and define appropriate credentialling requirements for persons to provide intervention for individuals diagnosed with autism and a system by which to evaluate such credentials. The task force must consist of physicians and persons who have been awarded doctoral degrees or master's degrees, including but not limited to neurologists and developmental pediatricians with a minimum of 5 years' experience working with persons with autism, parents guardians and advocates of persons with autism. The task force shall submit its report, together with any necessary implementing legislation, to the Second Regular Session of the Legislature no later than October 1, 1998.

This bill ensures the appropriate treatment of autism by establishing guidelines concerning the method, frequency and intensity of intervention that is provided to an individual. The bill also requires that a task force be established to set qualifications for persons that will provide intervention for individuals diagnosed with autism and sets standards for the practitioners who treat autism.
