HOUSE AMENDMENT "D" to S.P. 678, L.D. 1902, Bill, "An Act
to Amend the Filing Date Provision in the Maine Residents Property Tax Program, to Provide an Application Clause for
Certain Provisions of Law Relating to Computer Software, to Clarify Provisions of Law Regarding Transfers of Money from the
Tax Relief Fund for Maine Residents to the General Fund and to Correct Certain Provisions in Recently Enacted Legislation"

Amend the bill by striking out the title and substituting 24 the following:

 'An Act to Amend the Filing Date Provisions in the Maine Residents Property Tax Program, to Provide an Application Clause
 for Certain Provisions of Law Relating to Computer Software, to Clarify Provisions of Law Regarding Transfers of Money from the
 Tax Relief Fund for Maine Residents to the General Fund and to Change Other Provisions of Law'

Further amend the bill by inserting before the emergency 34 clause the following:

PART E

Sec. E-1. 20-A MRSA §15905, sub-§1, ¶A, as repealed and replaced by PL 1997, c. 469, §2, is repealed and the following
 enacted in its place:

42 A. The state board may approve projects as long as no project approval will cause debt service costs, as defined
44 in section 15603, subsection 8, paragraph A, to exceed the maximum limits specified in Table 1 in subsequent fiscal

The alcohol bureau shall compensate the Maine Turnpike Authority <u>and the Department of Transportation</u> for the full cost of erecting the-guidepost <u>those guideposts</u>.

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Sec. F-2. 28-A MRSA §403, sub-§2, as enacted by PL 1987, c. 45, Pt. A, §4, is amended to read:

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- 22

2. Location. One store must be located to be convenient to the southbound lanes of the Maine Turnpike near Exit 1 of the Maine Turnpike. <u>One store must be located in Calais.</u>

Sec. F-3. Study commission established. The Commissioner of Administrative and Financial Services shall establish a study 24 commission to explore the feasibility and benefits of locating a discount state liquor store in Fort Kent. The study commission 26 must include 2 business people from Fort Kent, appointed by the Director of Alcoholic Beverages and Lottery Operations; one 28 Legislator appointed jointly by the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House; and 2 people appointed by the 30 commissioner. The meetings of the study commission must be held 32 in Fort Kent. All appointments to the study commission must be completed within 15 days after the effective date of this Act. 34 After the completion of all appointments, the commissioner shall convene the first meeting of the study commission within 30 days after the effective date of this Act. The members of the study 36 commission shall select a chair from among its members. The study commission shall present its findings to the Joint Standing 38 Committee on Legal and Veterans' Affairs by January 1, 1998.

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Sec. G-1. 4 MRSA 3173, sub- 4, as amended by PL 1993, c. 675, Pt. B, 9, is further amended to read:

4. Distribution of fees and fines. All law enforcement
 48 officers appearing for a scheduled trial in District Court at
 times other than their regular working hours, at the order of a
 50 prosecuting official and whether or not they are called upon to

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give testimony, must be compensated out of the General Fund at the rate of \$10 <u>\$30</u> for each day or part of a day that the officer is required to be physically present.

The court officer required to be present at an arraignment may be an officer other than the arresting officer, provided that the municipality <u>or county</u> has designated the officer to handle the arraignment easelead <u>case load</u> of that municipality <u>or county</u>. In addition, one or more municipalities <u>or counties</u> may designate either a municipal law enforcement officer or a county law enforcement officer to represent the municipalities <u>or counties</u> at arraignments on a rotating schedule.

The court shall pay any municipality or county a flat fee of \$10 14 \$30 for each day or part of a day that a municipal law enforcement officer, designated by the municipality as its court 16 officer, or a county law enforcement officer, designated by the county as its court officer, is required to be physically present 18 in a District Court in order to adequately handle that 20 municipality's easelead or county's case load. In addition, the court shall pay any municipality or county a flat fee of \$10 \$30 22 per day for every day or part of a day, but no more than \$10 \$30 for any one day, the municipality or county loses the services of 24 one or more law enforcement officers because the officer or officers are performing some act authorized or required by the Maine Rules of Criminal Procedure or are witnesses in a criminal 26 or traffic infraction case within the jurisdiction of the A municipality or county is considered to have 28 District Court. lost the services of a law enforcement officer when the officer, 30 who normally performs duties of patrolling or maintaining order, is physically unable to perform those duties of patrolling and 32 maintaining order for the municipality or county.

34 The sheriffs of the several counties shall designate and furnish deputy sheriffs to serve as bailiffs in each division of the 36 District Court within their counties, if so requested by the Chief Judge. A deputy sheriff designated as bailiff must be 38 approved by the Chief Judge and may not serve as a court officer for any law enforcement agency.

Compensation for reasonable and necessary expenses, as agreed to 42 by the parties, must be paid by the District Court.

In those municipalities where a police officer has been furnished to serve as a bailiff, the Chief Judge may continue to authorize the use of a police officer as a bailiff and the municipality must be compensated by the District Court. A person new appointed to serve as bailiff may not serve as court officer for a municipal police department, as provided in this subsection.

A veteran of the Vietnam War must have served 48 on active duty for a period of more than 180 days, any part of which occurred after August-4-1964 February

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<u>27, 1961</u> and before May 7, 1975, unless the veteran died in service or was discharged for a service-connected disability after that date. "Vietnam War" means the period between $August-5_{7}-1964$ February <u>28, 1961</u> and May 7, 1975. "Persian Gulf War" means service on active duty between August 7, 1990 and April 11, 1991; or

(2) Who are disabled by injury or disease incurred or aggravated during active military service in the line of duty and are receiving any form of pension or compensation from the United States Government for total, service-connected disability.

The exemptions provided in this paragraph apply to the property of that veteran, including property held in joint tenancy with that veteran's spouse or held in a revocable living trust for the benefit of that veteran.

PART P

22 Sec. P-1. Transfer of funds. Notwithstanding the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 5, section 1518, the State Controller shall transfer from the Tax Relief Fund for Maine Residents to the 24 General Fund \$1,000,422 in fiscal year 1997-98 and \$3,783,305 in 26 fiscal year 1998-99 associated with the General Fund appropriations in Parts E, G, I, J, K and L and to offset the 28 General Fund revenue loss associated with Parts F and H.

Sec. P-2. Contingent effective date. Parts E, F, G, H, I, J, K
 and L take effect only if the State Controller certifies that the
 transfer to the Tax Relief Fund for Maine Residents at the end of
 fiscal year 1996-97 is sufficient to make the allocations and
 transfers required by Public Law 1997, chapter 557 and the
 transfers required by this Act.'

Further amend the bill by inserting at the end before the 38 summary the following:

'FISCAL NOTE

The Department of Education will require a General Fund 44 appropriation of \$2,100,000 in fiscal year 1998-99 for the estimated state share of debt service costs related to increasing 46 the school construction debt service limit to \$72,000,000.

 Opening a discount state liquor store in Calais will result in a loss of General Fund revenue estimated to be \$168,750 in fiscal year 1997-98 and \$225,000 in fiscal year 1998-99 from a

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reduced profit margin on existing sales shifted from the state liquor store and agency stores in that area. This revenue loss 2 may be partially offset by additional sales. The amount of any 4 additional sales can not be estimated.

The Department of Administrative and Financial Services will 6 incur some minor additional costs for the miscellaneous expenses of a study commission to explore the feasibility of locating a 8 discount state liquor store in Fort Kent. These costs can be absorbed by the department utilizing existing budgeted resources. 10

12 Restoring to 1/2 the percentage of revenue from net receipts that must be paid into the Housing Opportunities for Maine Fund effective July 1, 1999 will reduce General Fund revenue by 14 approximately \$2,500,000 annually beginning in fiscal year 16 1999-2000.

The bill expands the property tax exemption for certain 18 Pursuant to the Constitution of Maine, the State is veterans. 20 required to reimburse municipalities for 50% of the lost property tax revenue due to new or expanded exemptions. Additional 22 General Fund appropriations of \$28,560 annually will be required beginning in fiscal year 1999-2000 for the reimbursements due to the change in the year in which a veteran reaches the age of 62. 24 Another \$21,250 will be required, also in fiscal year 1999-2000, 26 for the reimbursements due to the change in the beginning date of the Vietnam War.

The Bureau of Taxation will incur some minor additional 30 costs to administer and audit additional claims for reimbursement beginning in fiscal year 1999-2000. These costs can be absorbed 32 within the bureau's existing budgeted resources.

The bill includes additional General Fund appropriations of 34 \$210,980 in fiscal year 1997-98 and \$210,980 in fiscal year 36 1998-99 to the Judicial Department to increase the reimbursement for law enforcement officers from \$10 per day to \$30 per day for serving as court officers or as witnesses. The estimated costs 38 for increasing the fee to \$30 per day for court officer services are \$160,980 annually. The estimated costs associated with the 40 witness fees may range between \$50,000 to \$150,000 annually. The General Fund appropriation amounts include only the minimum 42 amounts in this estimated range for witness services.

The additional sales tax exemption for nonprofit ambulance 46 and fire emergency services will decrease General Fund revenue by \$28,025 in fiscal year 1997-98 and \$29,416 in fiscal year 48 1998-99. The corresponding decreases in dedicated revenue to the Local Government Fund for state-municipal revenue sharing will be 50 \$1,506 and \$1,566, respectively.

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The additional costs associated with notifying affected 2 retailers can be absorbed by the Bureau of Taxation utilizing existing budgeted resources.

The bill includes General Fund appropriations of \$67,533 and б \$93,427 in fiscal years 1997-98 and 1998-99, respectively, to establish the Elder Abuse and Fraud Unit within the Department of 8 the Attorney General.

The bill provides General Fund appropriations of \$36,000 in 12 each of fiscal years 1997-98 and 1998-99 to the Bureau of Rehabilitation within the Department of Labor to support advocacy and case management services at the Maine Center on Deafness. 14

The Department of the Attorney General will be provided 16 additional General Fund appropriations of \$89,134 and \$88,482 in 18 fiscal years 1997-98 and 1998-99, respectively, for the salary, benefit and overhead costs of one Assistant Attorney General 20 position and one Research Assistant position for legal services related to recoveries attributed to tobacco use.

The bill also provides General Fund appropriations to 24 within the Department of Mental Health, Mental programs Retardation and Substance Abuse Services of \$400,000 and 26 \$1,000,000 in fiscal years 1997-98 and 1998-99, respectively, for day services for people with mental retardation who are not class 28 members.

30 The losses of General Fund revenue and the General Fund appropriations in the 1998-99 biennium described above will only take effect if sufficient resources are available 32 to be transferred from the Tax Relief Fund for Maine Residents.'

SUMMARY

38 This amendment does the following.

40 It provides funds for the estimated state share of debt 1. service from increasing the school construction debt limit.

It authorizes a state discount liquor store in Calais 2. and authorizes a study of the feasibility and benefits of 44 locating a discount state liquor store in Fort Kent.

It increases the reimbursement for county and municipal 3. law enforcement officers for court officer services or for 48 serving as witnesses.

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4. It exempts from the sales tax sales to incorporated nonprofit fire departments and incorporated nonprofit ambulance services.

5. It appropriates funds to create an elder abuse and fraud 6 unit within the Department of the Attorney General.

6. It appropriates funds to support advocacy and case management services at the Maine Center on Deafness.

7. It provides funds to establish positions in the Attorney
 12 General's Office for legal services related to recoveries attributed to tobacco use.

8. It provides funds for day services for people with 16 mental retardation who are not class members.

 9. It restores to 1/2 the percentage of revenue from net receipts that the Treasurer of State must credit to the General
 Fund and restores to 1/2 the percentage of revenue from net receipts that must be paid into the Housing Opportunities for
 Maine Fund, effective July 1, 1999.

 10. It requires that all personnel employed by the State or under contract with the State who are involved with the
 monitoring, inspection or licensing of nuclear power plants must provide information and assistance to the Legislature, upon its
 request.

30 11. It expands the property tax exemption for certain veterans.

12. It authorizes transfers from the Tax Relief Fund for
Maine Residents back to the General Fund to fund various General Fund appropriations and General Fund revenue losses in the
1998-99 biennium. It also makes the effective date of those parts that represent a cost to the General Fund contingent upon
the certification by the State Controller that sufficient resources are available in the Tax Relief for Maine Residents
Fund.

13. This amendment also adds a fiscal note to the bill.
