- 5. Possession and use of cigarettes, cigarette papers or tobacco products; false identification use of prohibited. -A- Except as provided in paragraph A, a person under 18 years of age may not purchase, possess or use cigarettes, cigarette paper orany tobacco product or offer identification in an attempt to purchase any tobacco products or to purchase, possess or use cigarettes, cigarette paper or any other tobacco product.
- A. A person under 18 years of age may transport or permit to be transported in a motor vehicle cigarettes, cigarette paper or tobacco products if the transportation is in the scope of that person's employment or at the request of that person's parent, legal guardian or custodian, as defined in section 4002.

SUMMARY

This bill allows a juvenile to transport tobacco products in a motor vehicle if this transportation is in the scope of the juvenile's employment or at the request of the juvenile's parent or legal guardian. The bill parallels current law with respect to the transportation of liquor by a juvenile.
