Notwithstanding the registration requirements in this chapter, there is a 50-mile-wide buffer zone, beginning on the Quebec and Maine border at Estcourt Station and extending a distance of 50 miles into Maine perpendicular to the border and moving eastward within that buffer zone following the Maine and Canadian border and ending at the Maine and New Brunswick border in the Houlton area, in which a nonresident operator of a snowmobile that is properly registered in the adjacent province may operate that snowmobile without being registered in this State.

This bill creates a 50-mile buffer zone on the northern Maine border in which a snowmobile registered in New Brunswick or Quebec, but not in this State, may be operated.
